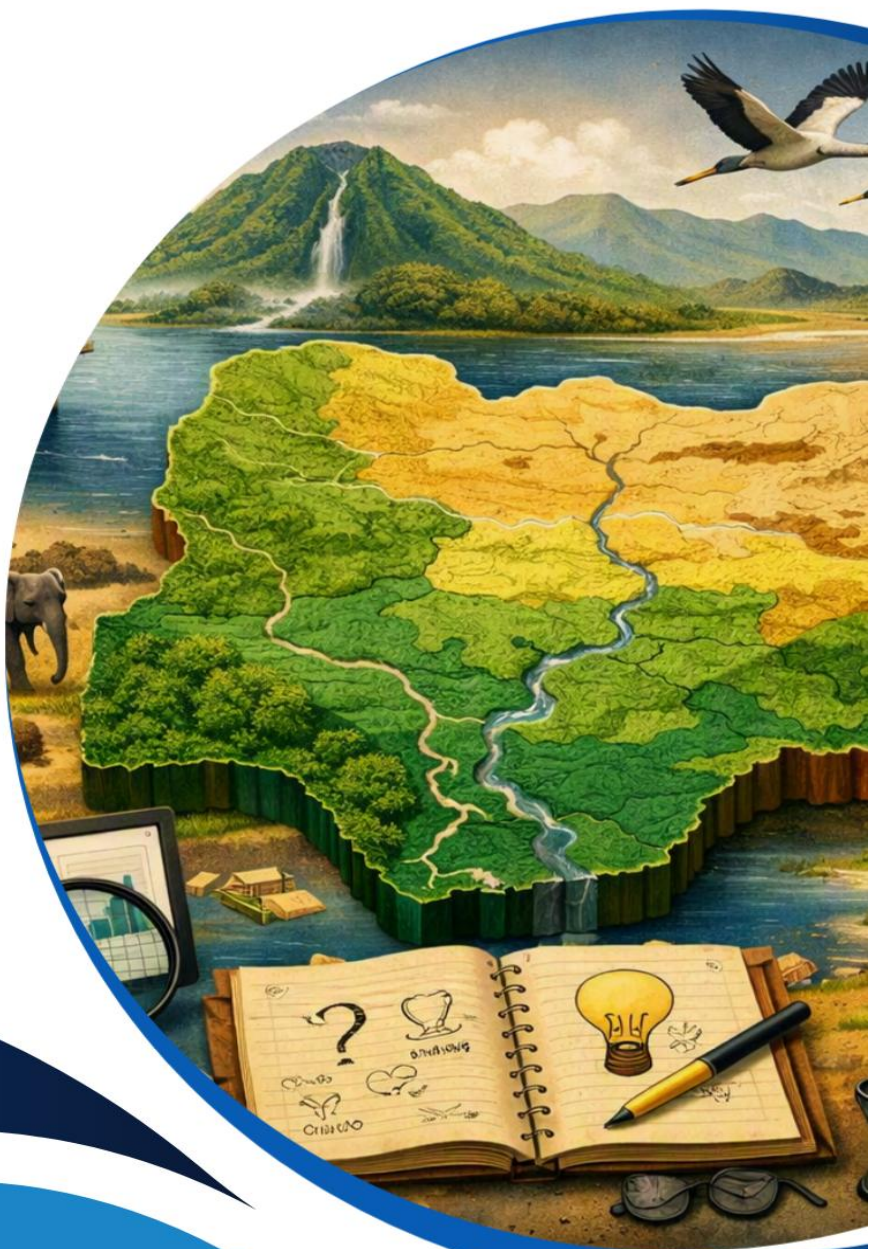

1.1 Conceptual Foundations of Geography

1.1.1 Definition and scope of geography

Geography is the study of the **earth's surface**, its **physical features**, and the **human activities** that interact with these features. The word originates from the Greek words *geo* meaning earth and *graphia* meaning description. In modern scholarship, geography goes beyond description to include analysis and interpretation of spatial patterns. It examines how people relate to their environment, how resources are distributed, and how societies develop in different places.



The **scope of geography** is broad, covering both the **physical environment** (such as landforms, climate, vegetation, and soils) and the **human environment** (such as population, settlements, industries, and transport systems).

1.1.2 Systematic versus regional geography

Systematic geography is concerned with studying specific themes or phenomena across space. For example, one might study **population distribution, urban systems, or industrialisation** across Nigeria. This approach allows for comparisons and generalisations, helping learners to see patterns and trends.

Regional geography, on the other hand, focuses on a particular area, such as Nigeria, and examines how physical and human factors interact within that space. It provides a holistic view of the region, showing how climate, vegetation, population, and economic activities combine to shape development.

Both approaches are complementary. Systematic geography provides analytical tools, while regional geography offers contextual understanding. Together, they help us to appreciate Nigeria's diverse landscapes and socio-economic systems.

An **urban system** is the network of towns and cities within a country, including their size, functions, and relationships. Urban systems reveal how settlements are organised, how they interact, and how they contribute to national development.

1.2 Nigeria's Physical and Human Setting

1.2.1 Spatial location and boundaries

Nigeria is located in **West Africa**, lying approximately between latitudes 4° and 14° North and longitudes 3° and 15° East. It shares boundaries with **Benin** to the west, **Niger** to the north, **Chad** to the northeast, and **Cameroon** to the east. To the south, Nigeria is bordered by the **Atlantic Ocean**, specifically the Gulf of Guinea.

This strategic location places Nigeria at the crossroads of West Africa, giving it access to both inland neighbours and maritime trade routes.

1.2.2 Physical features and ecological background

Nigeria's physical environment is diverse. The country has a variety of **landforms**, including coastal plains in the south, plateaus in the centre, and mountains in the east. The **River Niger** and **River Benue** are the two major rivers, meeting at Lokoja to form a Y-shaped confluence that drains into the Atlantic Ocean.



The **climate** ranges from equatorial in the south, through tropical in the middle belt, to semi-arid in the far north. This variation supports different **ecological zones**, such as mangrove swamps, rainforest, savannah, and Sahel. Each zone influences agricultural practices, settlement patterns, and resource use.

1.2.3 Human and socio-economic context



Nigeria has a population of over 200 million people, making it the most populous country in Africa. The population is unevenly distributed, with dense concentrations in the south and along river valleys, and sparser settlements in the arid north.

The country is ethnically diverse, with major groups including the **Hausa-Fulani**, **Yoruba**, and **Igbo**, alongside many smaller groups. This diversity contributes to Nigeria's rich cultural heritage but also presents challenges for national integration.

Economically, Nigeria is endowed with abundant **natural resources**, particularly oil and gas, which dominate export earnings. Agriculture remains a major employer, while industries and services are expanding in urban centres such as Lagos, Abuja, and Port Harcourt.

1.3 Thematic Approaches to Nigerian Geography

1.3.1 Importance of thematic study

1.3.2 Linkages between physical and human systems

Nigeria's geography demonstrates strong linkages between **physical systems** (such as rivers, climate, and vegetation) and **human systems** (such as agriculture, transport, and settlement). For example, fertile river basins support farming and attract dense populations, while arid zones limit agricultural productivity and encourage migration.

Understanding these linkages helps explain why certain regions are more industrialised or urbanised than others. It also shows how environmental factors influence socio-economic development.

2.1 Nigeria's Major Ecological Zones

Nigeria is characterised by diverse **ecological zones**, which are broad areas defined by climate, vegetation, and physical features. These zones influence human activities such as farming, settlement, and industry. By studying them, you will gain insight into how geography shapes life and development across the country.

2.1.1 Coastal and mangrove zones

2.1.2 Rainforest zone

2.1.3 Savannah zone

Settlements are widespread, and the savannah supports major transport routes linking the north and south.

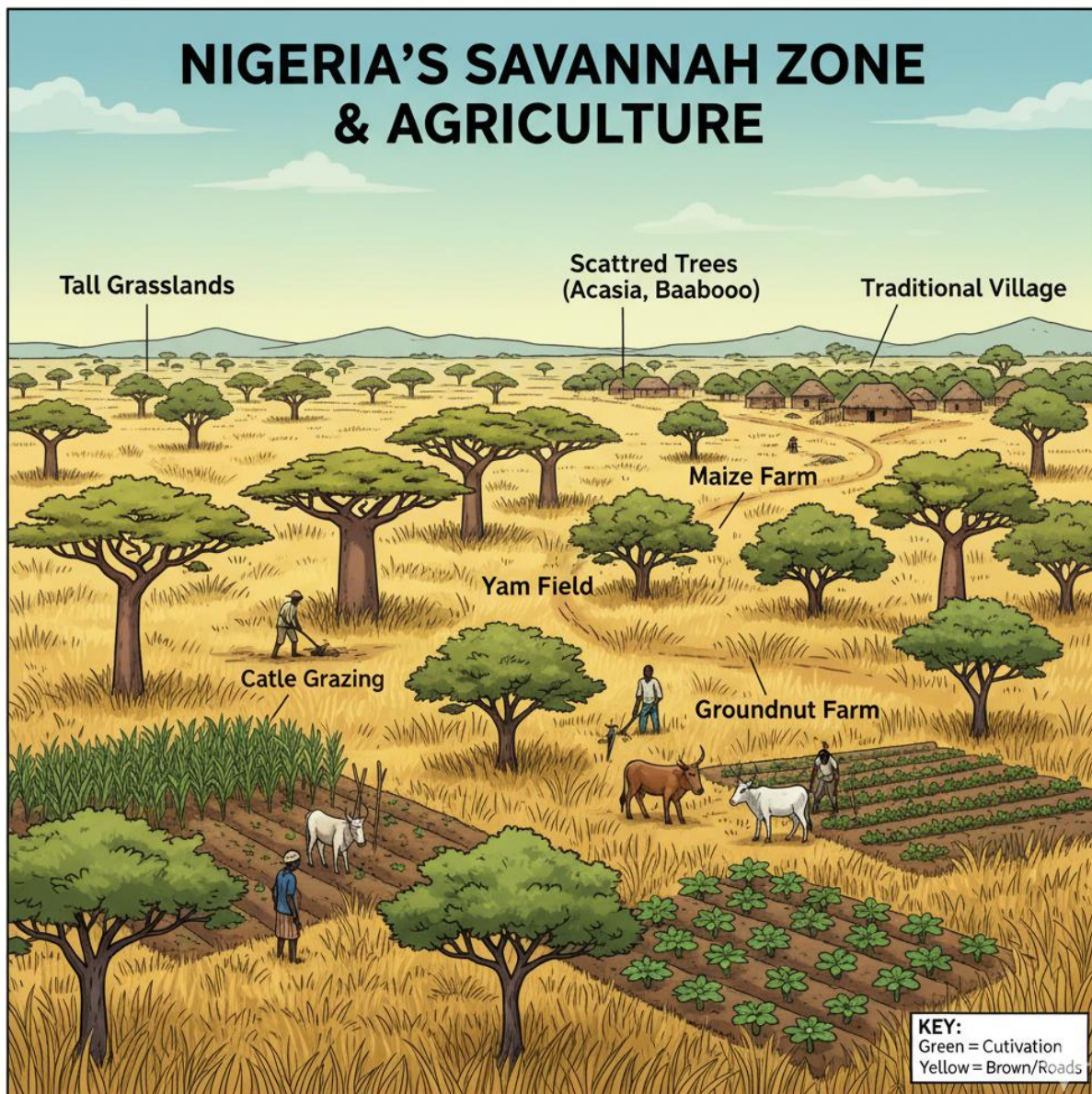


Figure 2.2: Savannah zone and farming activities

2.1.4 Sahel zone

The **Sahel zone** lies in the far north of Nigeria, bordering the Sahara Desert. It is semi-arid, with sparse vegetation and low rainfall. Human activities here include subsistence farming, pastoralism, and trade across the desert. However, the zone faces challenges such as desertification, drought, and resource scarcity.

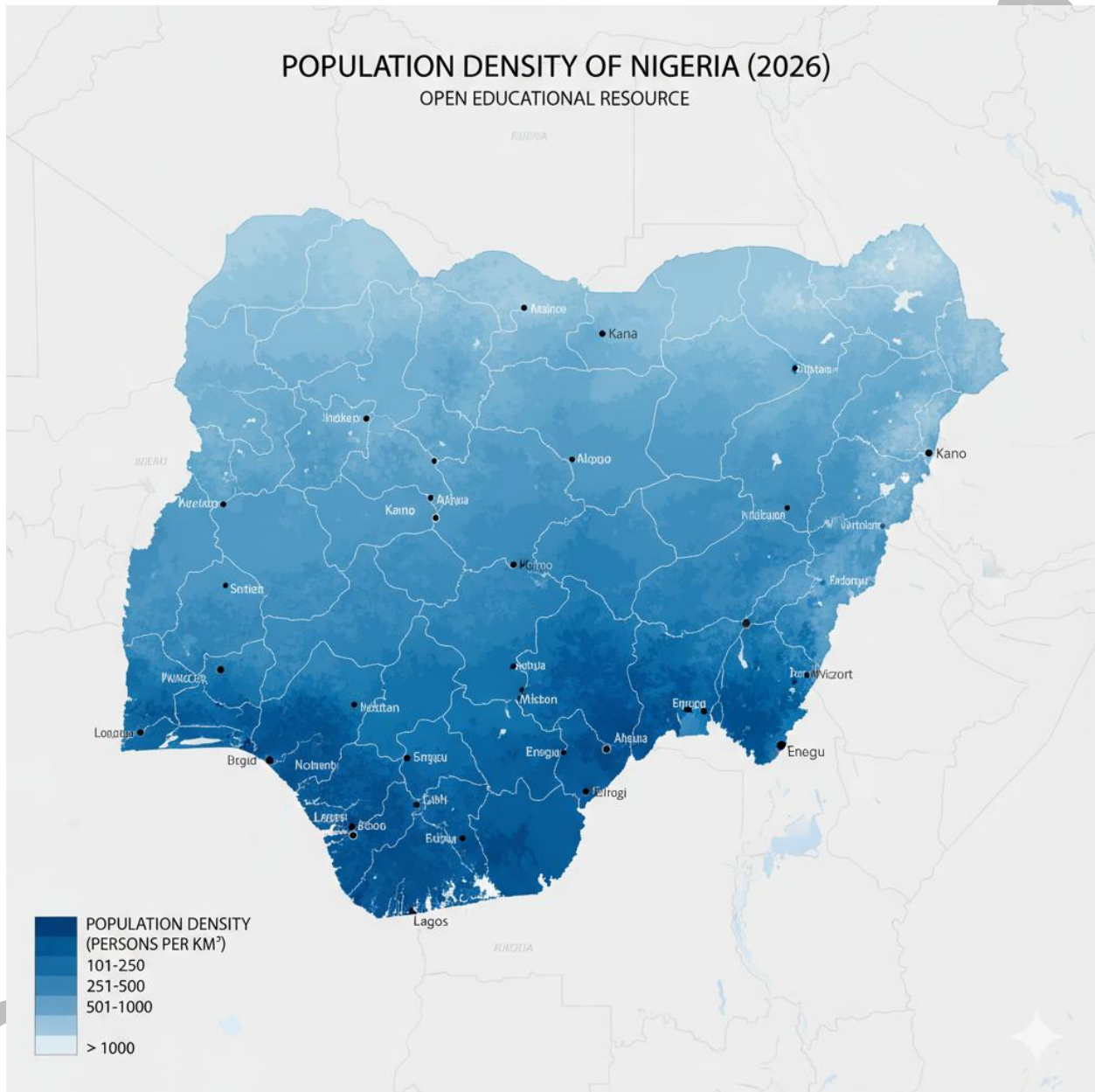


Figure 2.3: Population distribution in Nigeria

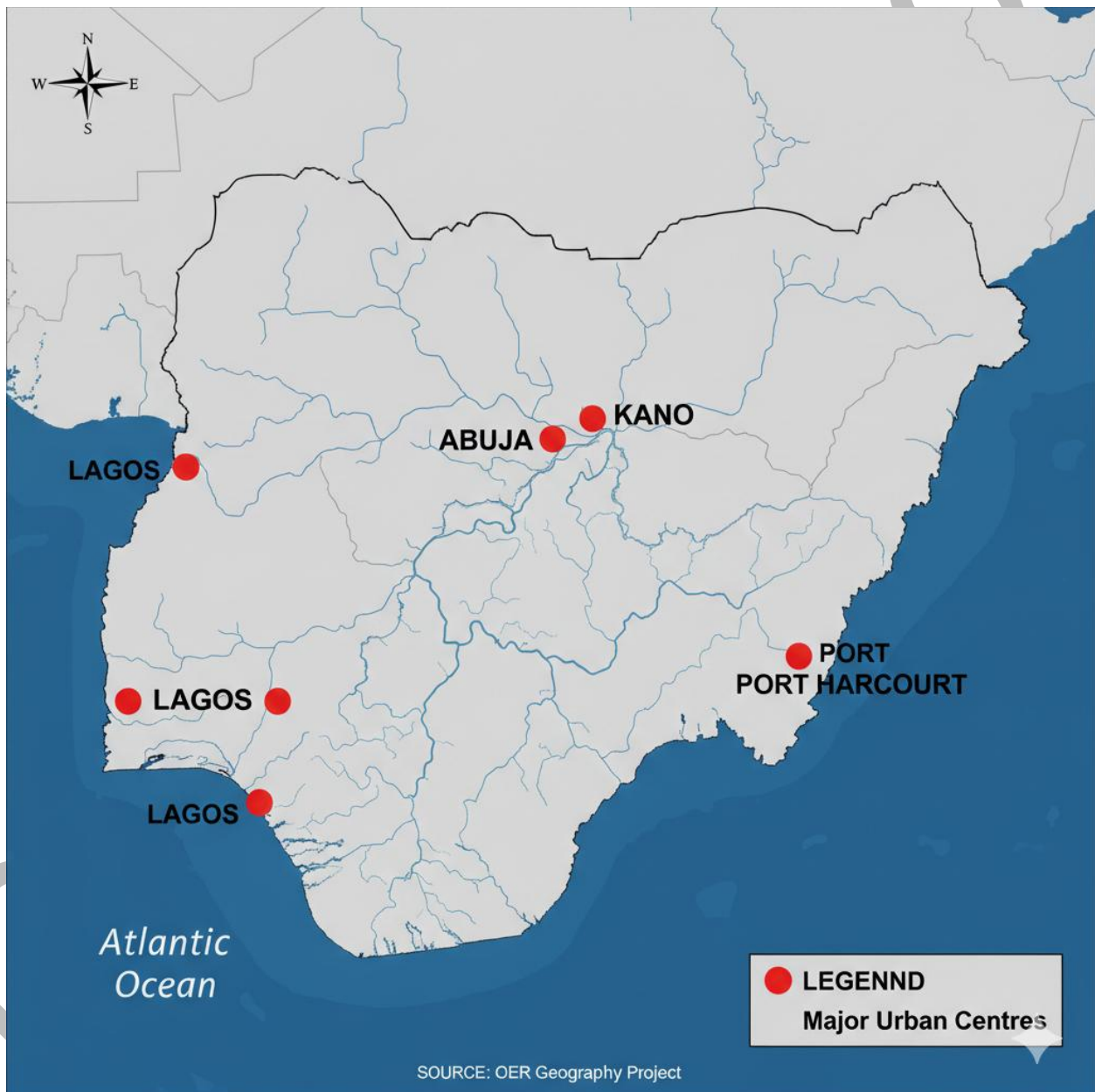


Figure 2.4: Urban settlement patterns in Nigeria

2.3 Resource Distribution and Development Implications

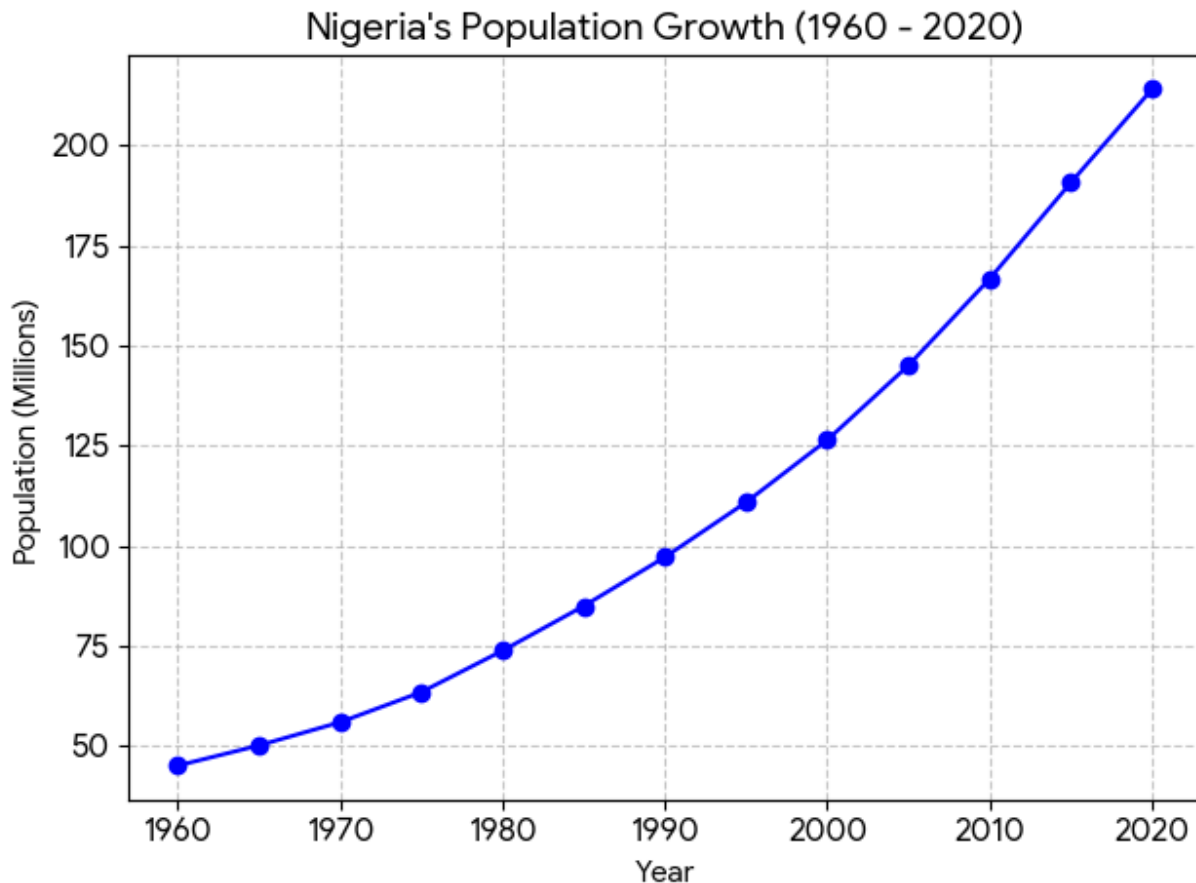


Figure 3.1: Trends in Nigeria's population growth

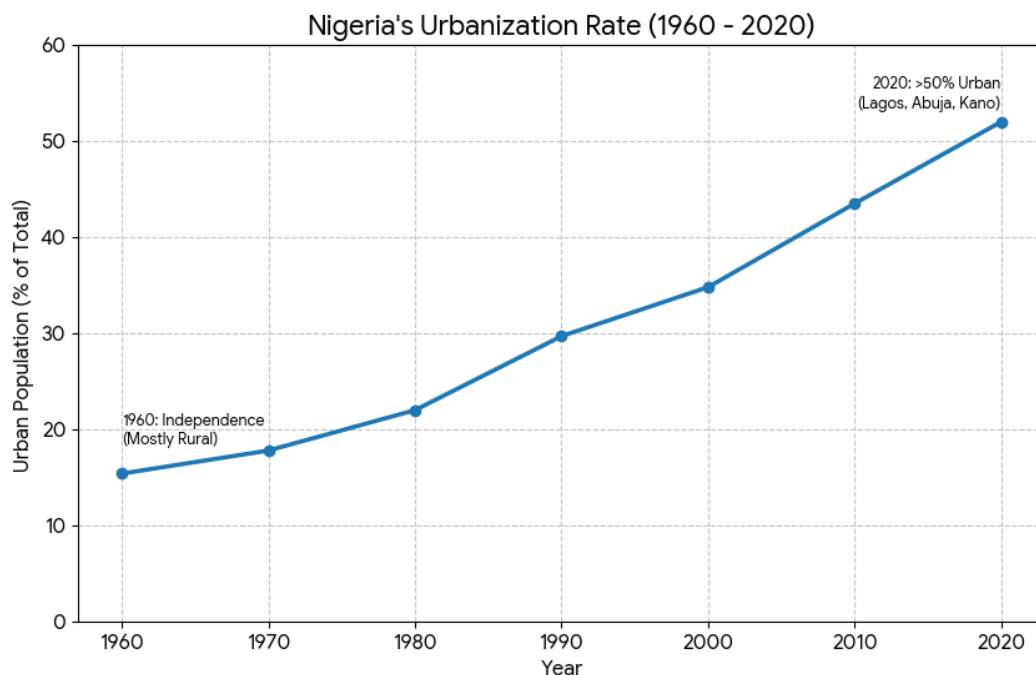


Figure 3.2: Patterns of urbanisation in Nigeria

4.1 Natural Resources Of Nigeria

4.1.1 Classification of resources

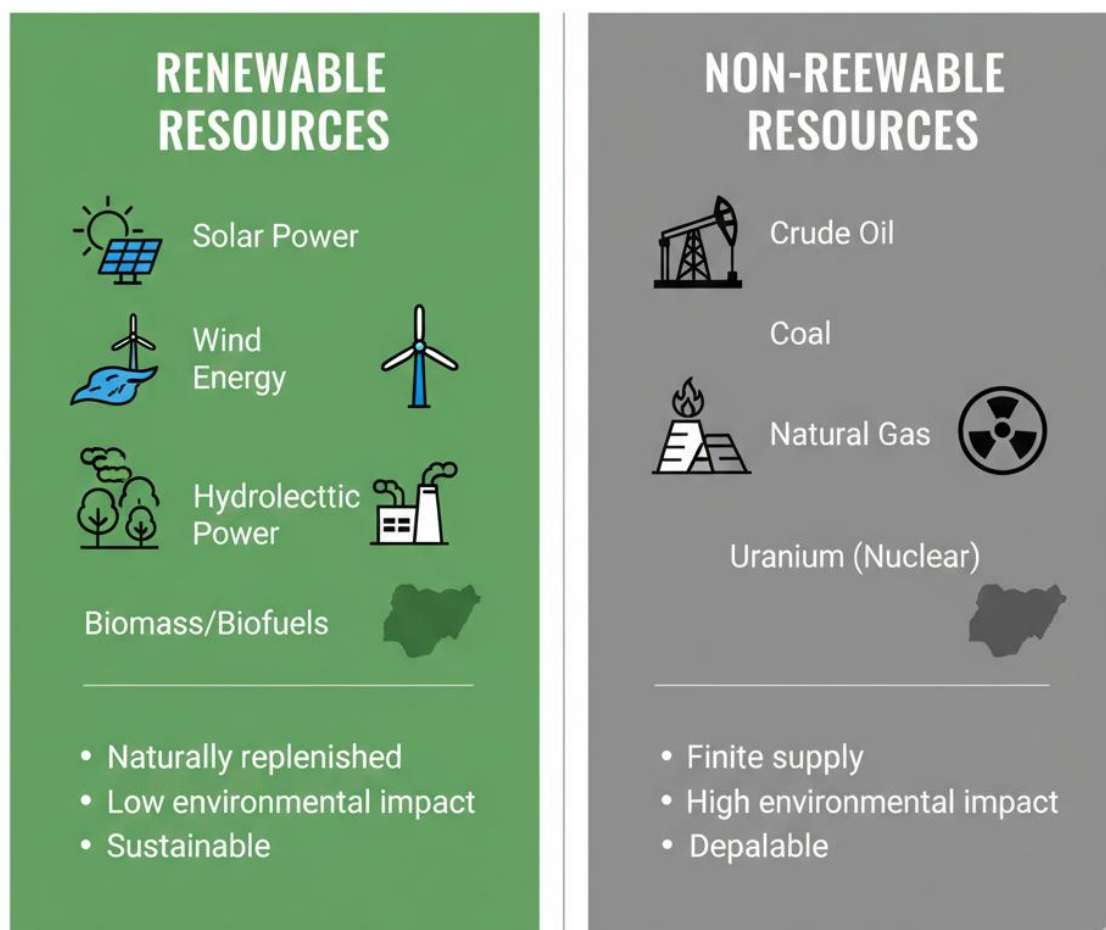
Nigeria is endowed with a wide range of **natural resources**, which are materials found in the environment that can be utilised for economic and social development. These resources are generally classified into two categories: **renewable resources**, which can be replenished naturally over time such as forests, water, and agricultural land, and **non-renewable resources**, which are finite and cannot be replaced once exhausted, such as crude oil, coal, and metallic minerals.

4.1 Classification of Nigeria's natural resources.

4.1.2 Distribution of major resources

The distribution of resources across Nigeria is uneven, reflecting the country's diverse geology and ecology. **Crude oil** is concentrated in the Niger Delta region, while **coal** is found in Enugu and surrounding areas. **Tin** and **columbite** are located on the Jos Plateau, whereas **limestone** and **iron ore** occur in several states including Kogi and Ogun. Renewable resources such as forests are more abundant in the southern regions, while water resources are spread across rivers and aquifers nationwide.

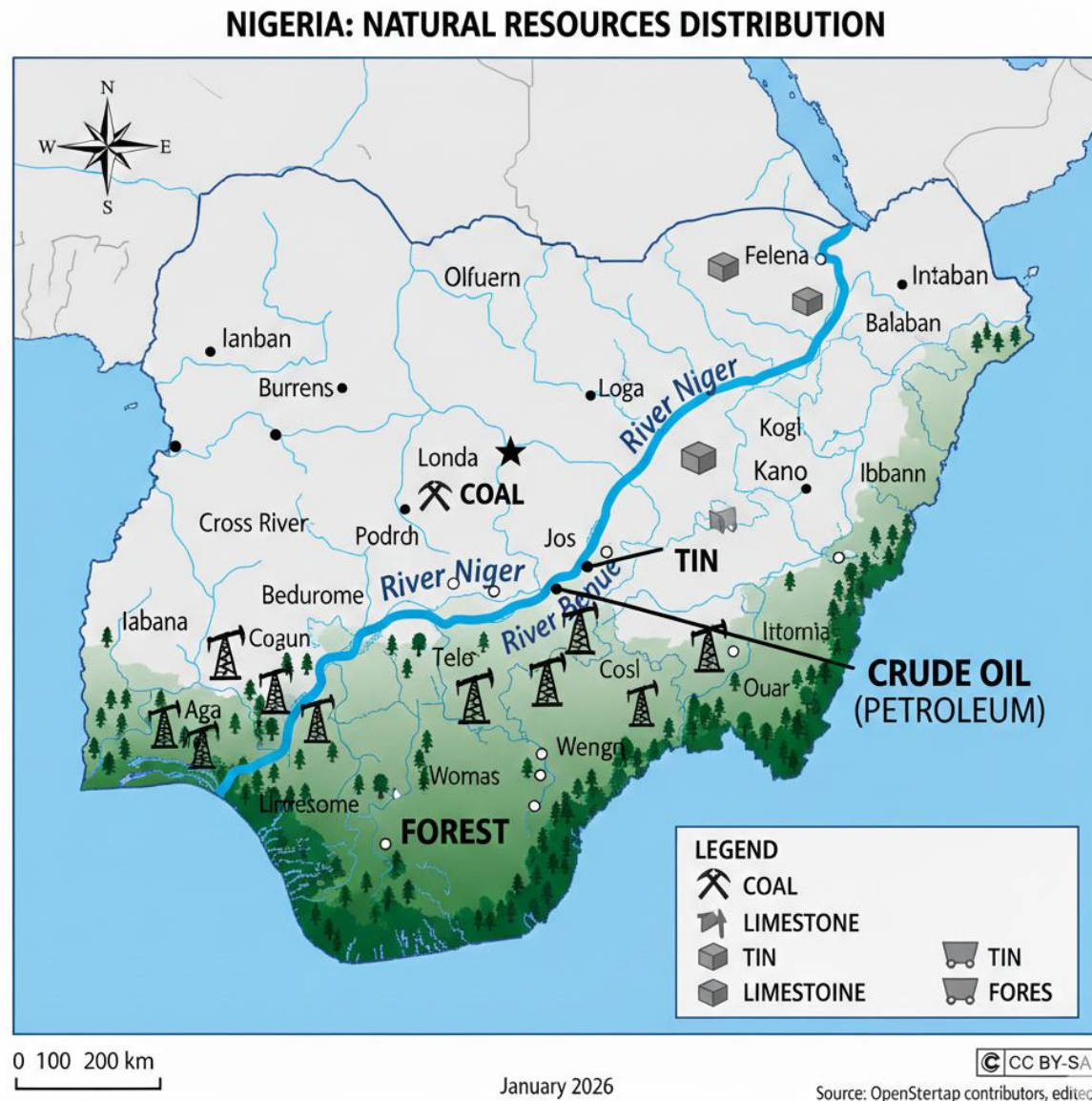


Plate 4.1 Distribution of Nigeria's major resources.

4.1.3 Resource utilisation and sustainability issues

The exploitation of Nigeria's resources has contributed significantly to national income, particularly through oil exports. However, unsustainable practices such as over-logging, oil spills, and unregulated mining have led to environmental degradation. **Sustainability** refers to the responsible use of resources in ways that meet present needs without compromising the



ability of future generations to meet theirs. Addressing sustainability challenges requires policies that balance economic growth with environmental protection.

4.2 Agricultural Systems And Practices

4.2.1 Traditional farming systems

Agriculture in Nigeria has long been shaped by traditional practices that reflect the country's diverse ecological zones and cultural heritage. **Subsistence farming** refers to small-scale cultivation where farmers grow crops mainly for household consumption rather than for sale.

Shifting cultivation is a system where land is cleared, farmed for a few years, and then abandoned to regain fertility, while farmers move to new plots. **Pastoralism** involves the rearing of livestock such as cattle, goats, and sheep, often in semi-arid regions where crop farming is less viable. These systems are deeply rooted in local knowledge but face challenges of low productivity and vulnerability to environmental change.

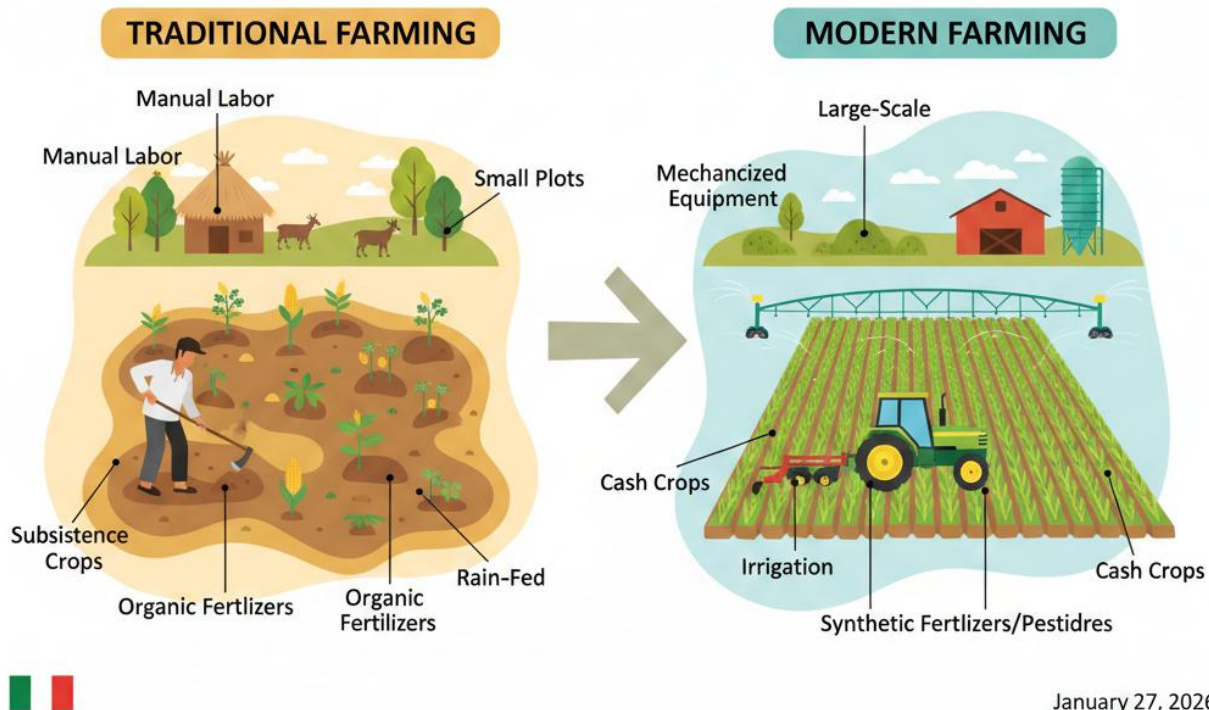
4.2.2 Modern agricultural practices

4.2.3 Regional variations in agricultural production

4.3 Industrialisation In Nigeria

4.3.1 Historical development of industries

Industrialisation in Nigeria began during the colonial period, when industries were established mainly to process raw materials for export. Early examples included cocoa processing plants and palm oil mills. After independence, the government promoted industrial growth through import substitution policies, which encouraged local production of goods previously imported. 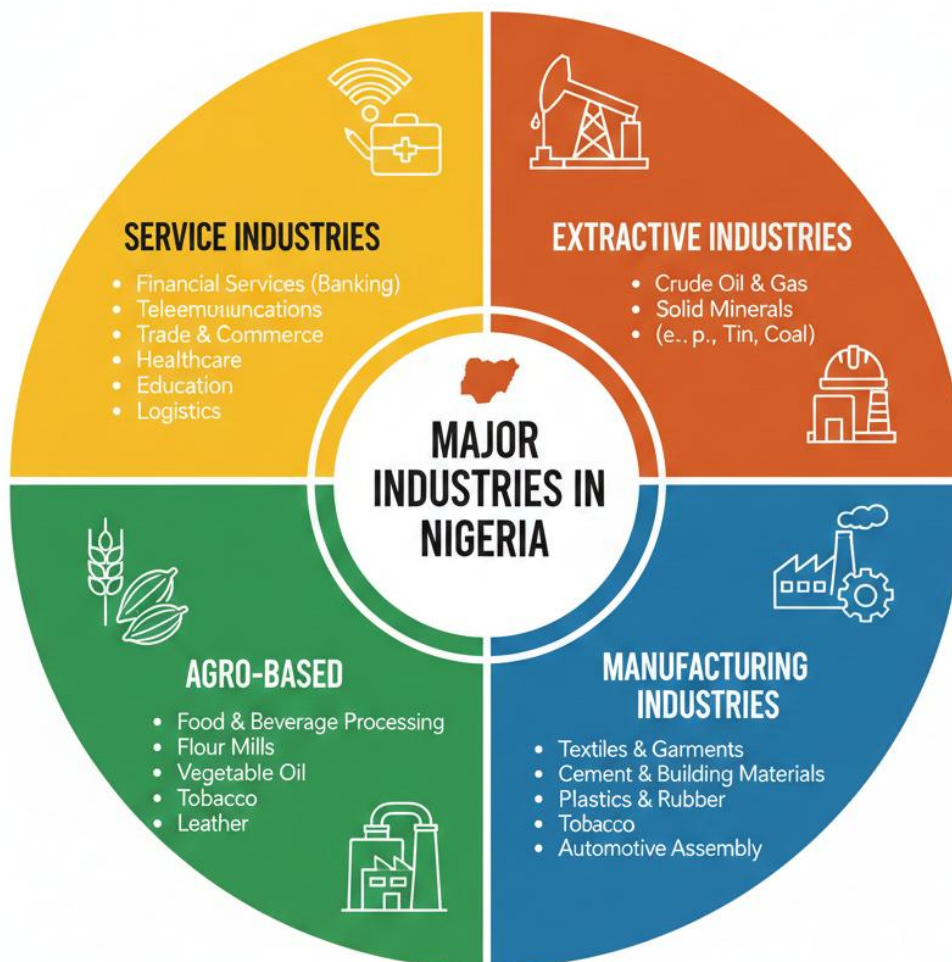

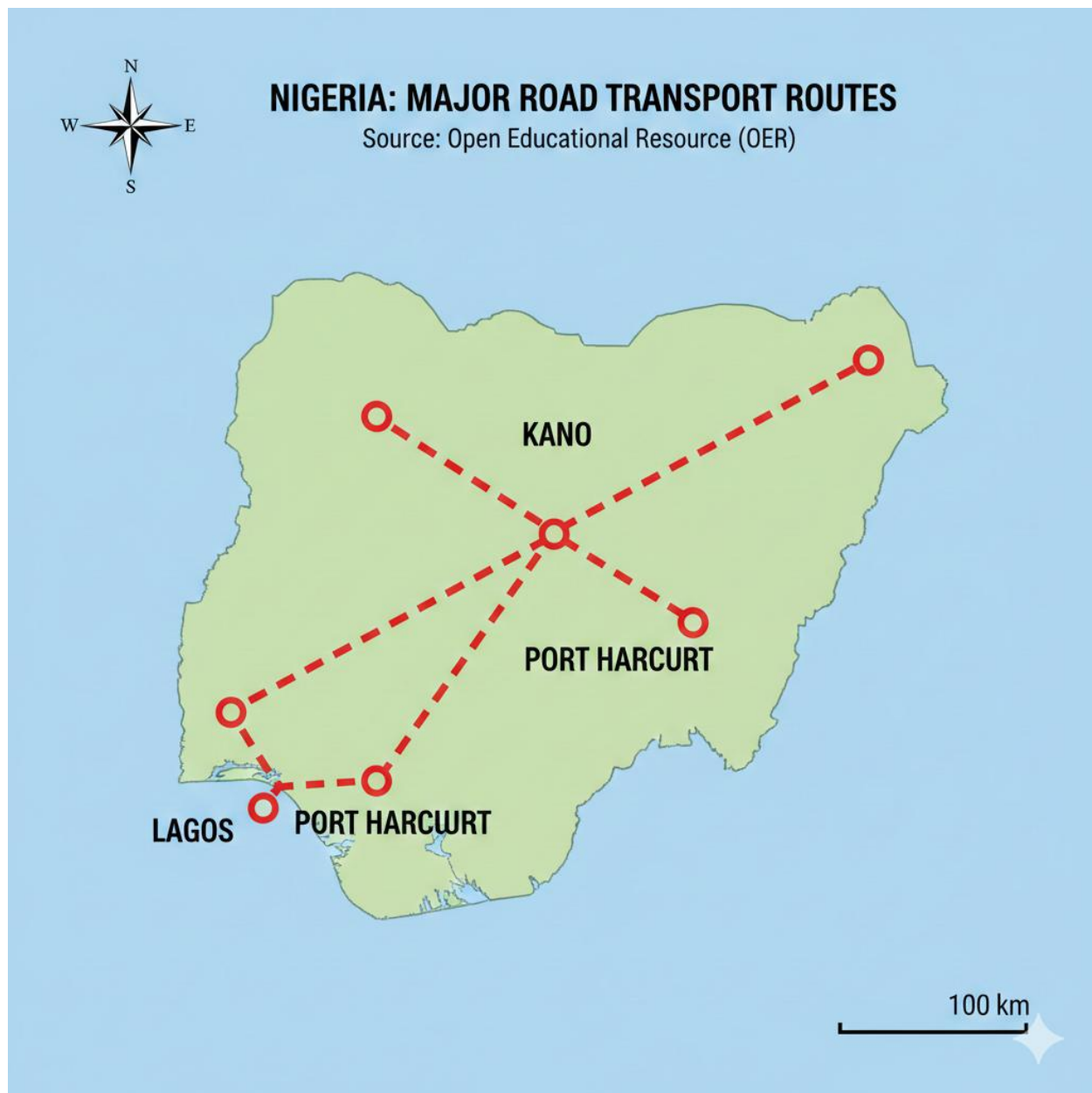


Figure 5.1 Major road transport routes in Nigeria.

5.2 Exchange Networks And Trade Patterns

Trade and exchange are central to Nigeria's economy, linking producers, consumers, and markets both within and beyond the country. Exchange networks include formal and informal systems that facilitate the movement of goods and services, shaping regional integration and global participation.

5.2.2 External trade



External trade involves the exchange of goods and services between Nigeria and other countries. 5.3 Development Strategies In Nigeria



Development strategies are deliberate plans and policies designed to promote economic growth, improve living standards, and ensure sustainable national progress. In Nigeria, these strategies have evolved over time, reflecting changing priorities, challenges, and opportunities.

5.3.1 National development plans

National development plans are government-led programmes aimed at guiding economic and social progress over a set period. Nigeria has implemented several such plans, beginning with the First National Development Plan (1962–1968), which focused on infrastructure and agriculture.
