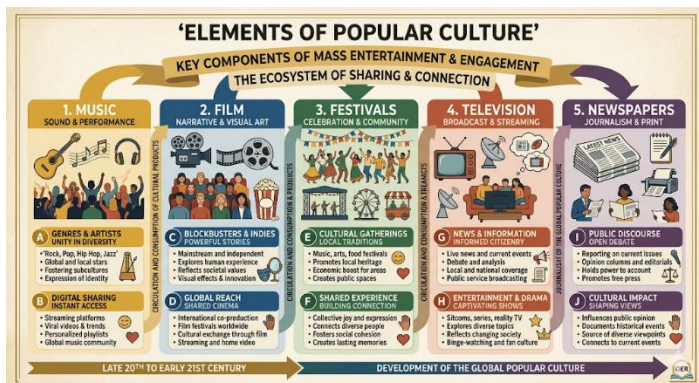


Figure 1.1: Elements of popular culture

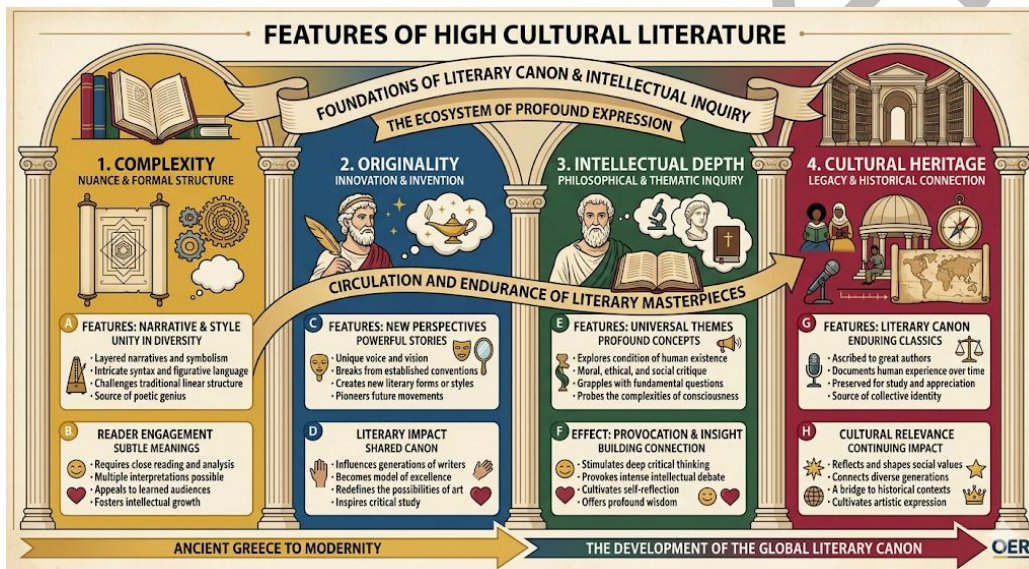


Figure 1.2: Features of high cultural literature

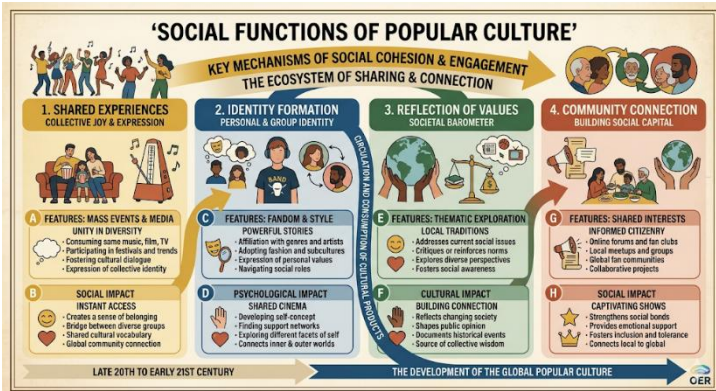


Figure 1.3: Social functions of popular culture

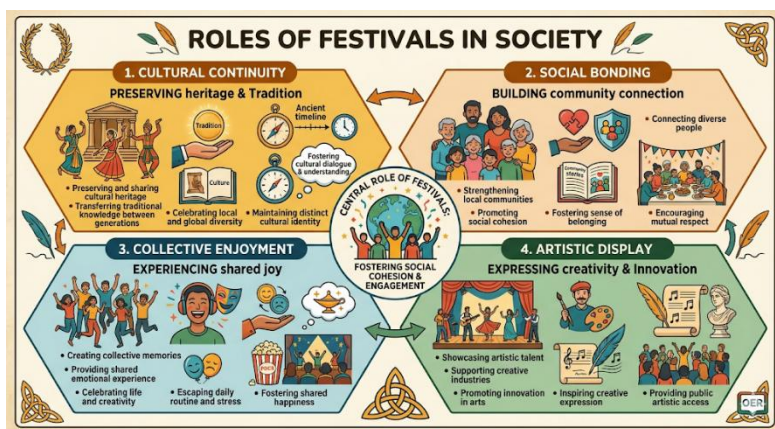


Figure 2.1: Roles of festivals in society

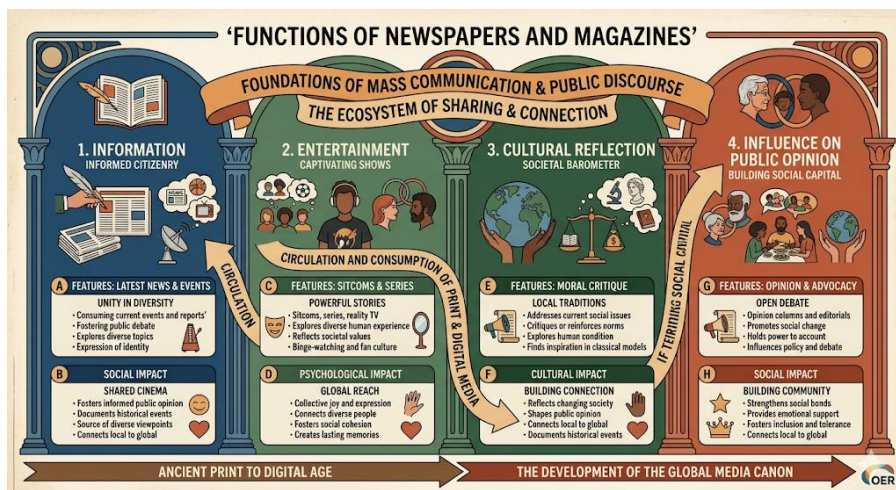


Figure 2.2: Functions of newspapers and magazines

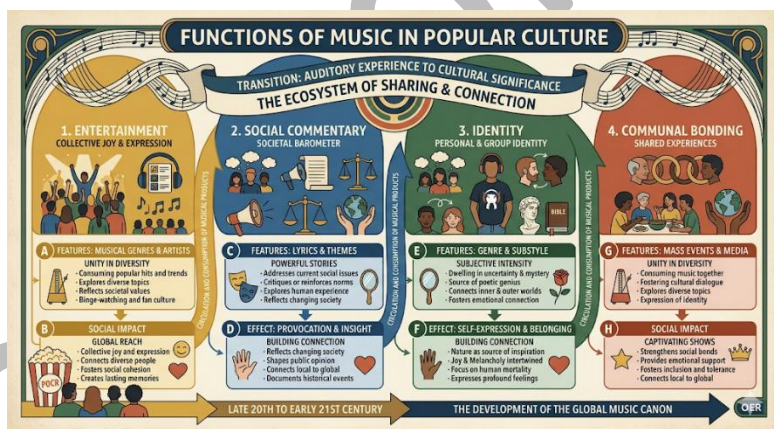


Figure 2.3: Functions of music in popular culture

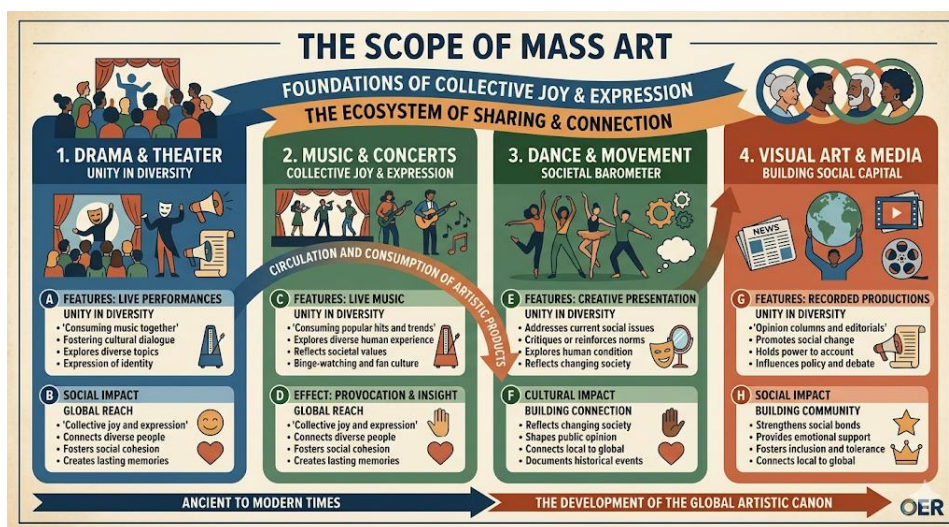


Figure 3.2: Scope of mass art

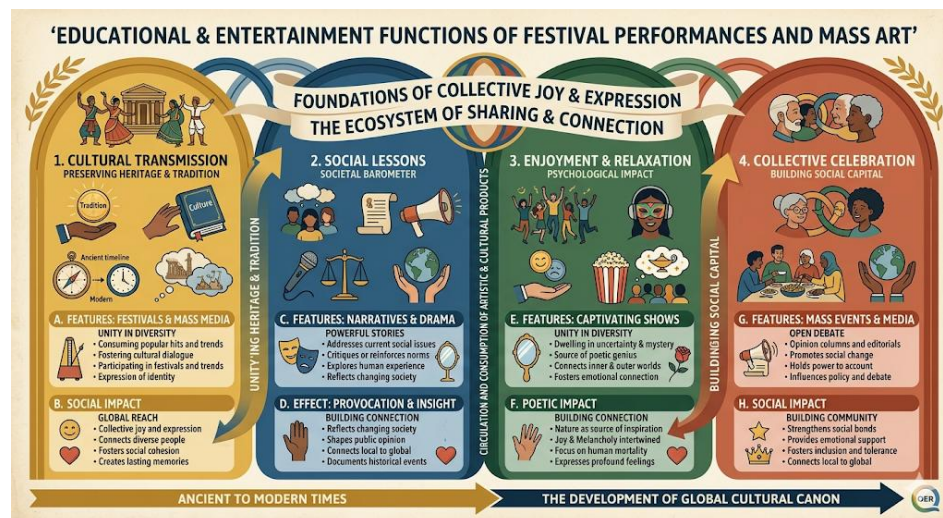


Figure 3.3: Educational and entertainment functions of festival performances and mass art

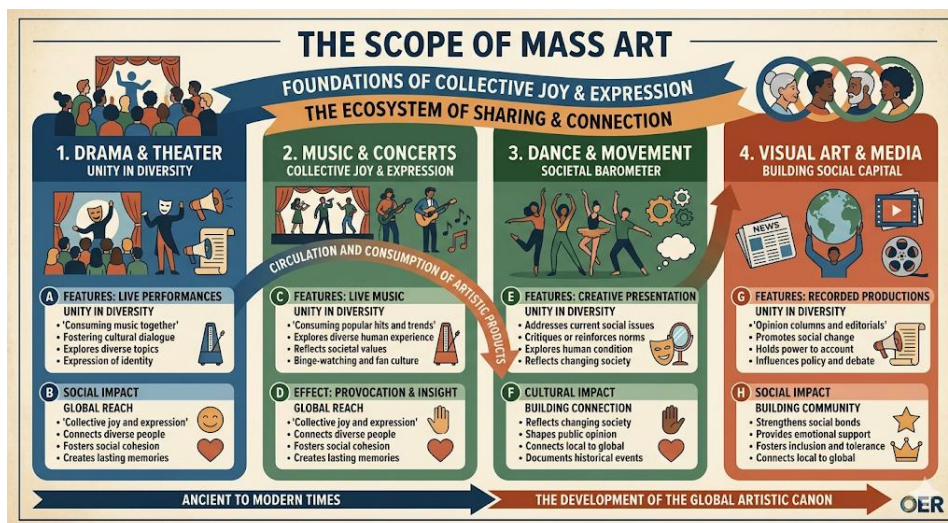


Figure 3.2: Scope of mass art

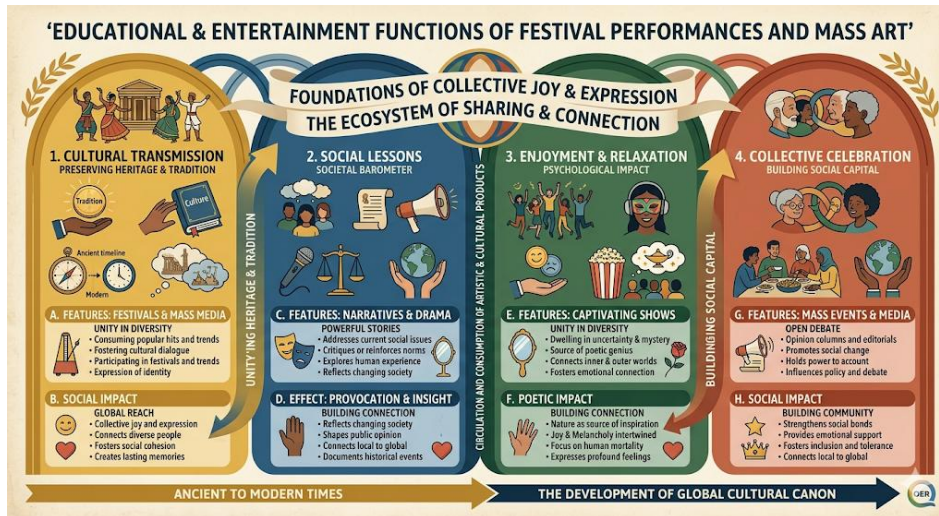


Figure 3.3: Educational and entertainment functions of festival performances and mass art

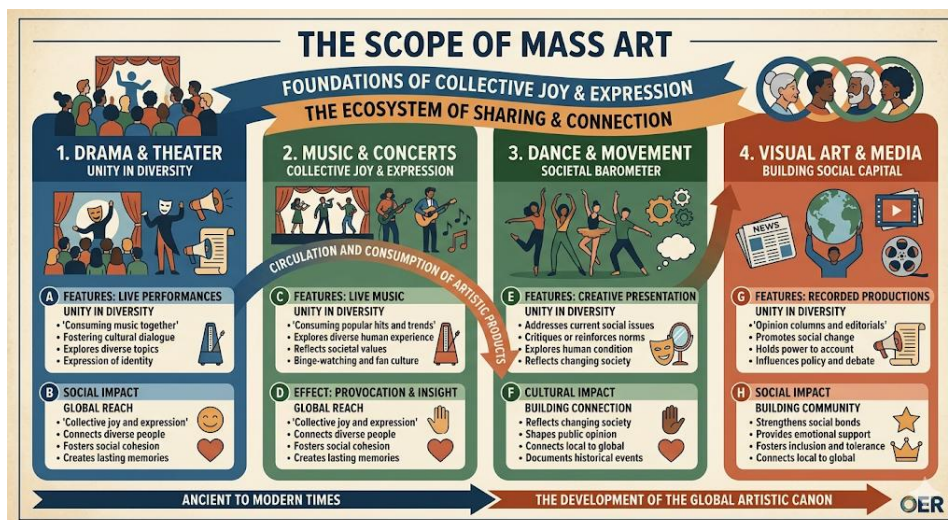


Figure 3.2: Scope of mass art

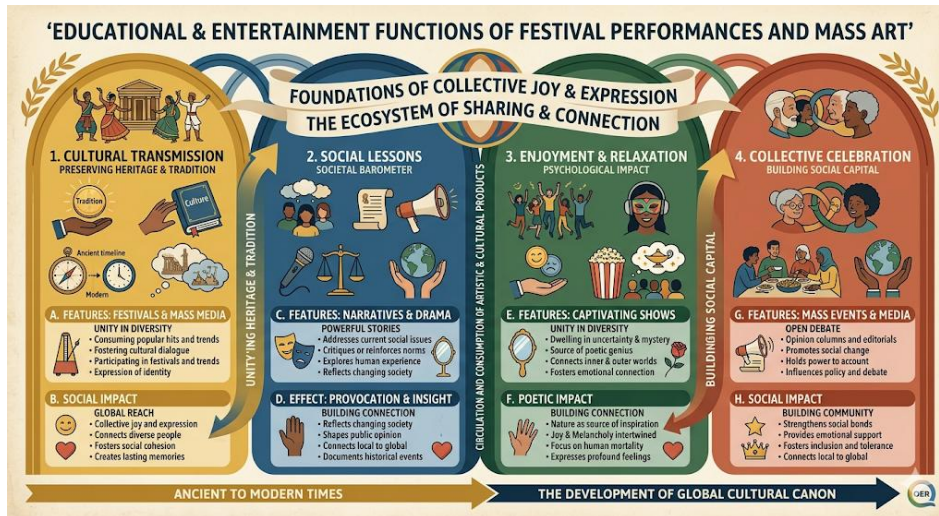


Figure 3.3: Educational and entertainment functions of festival performances and mass art

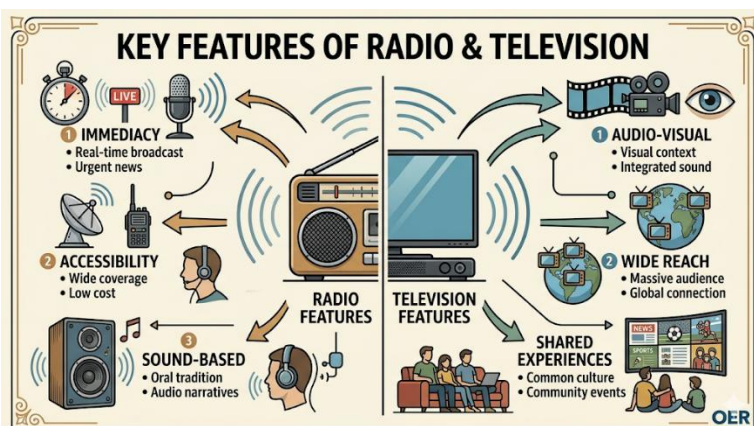


Figure 5.3: Features of radio and television in popular culture

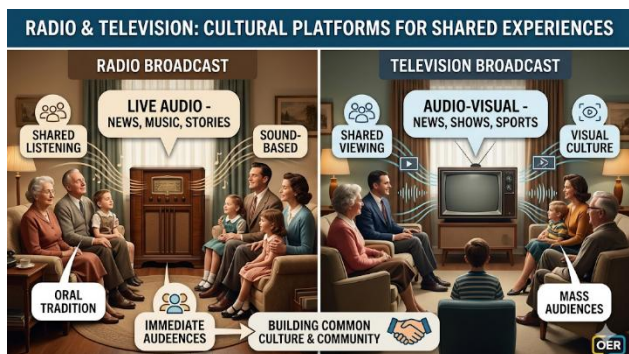


Plate 5.3: Radio and television as cultural platforms
