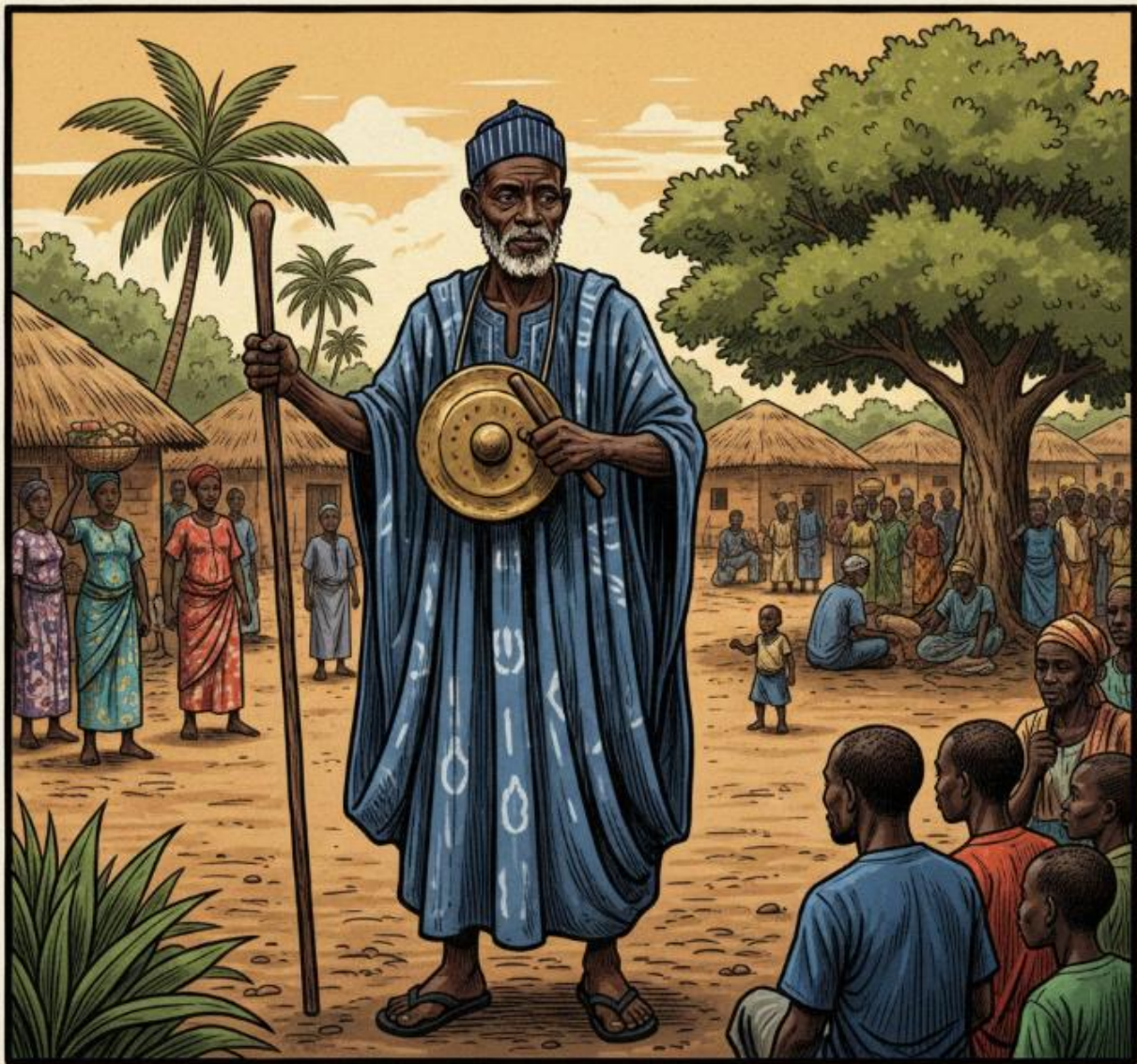
1.1.2 Traditional editing practices before modern media

1.2 Development of Editing in Nigeria

1.2.1 Colonial-era newspapers and editorial practices

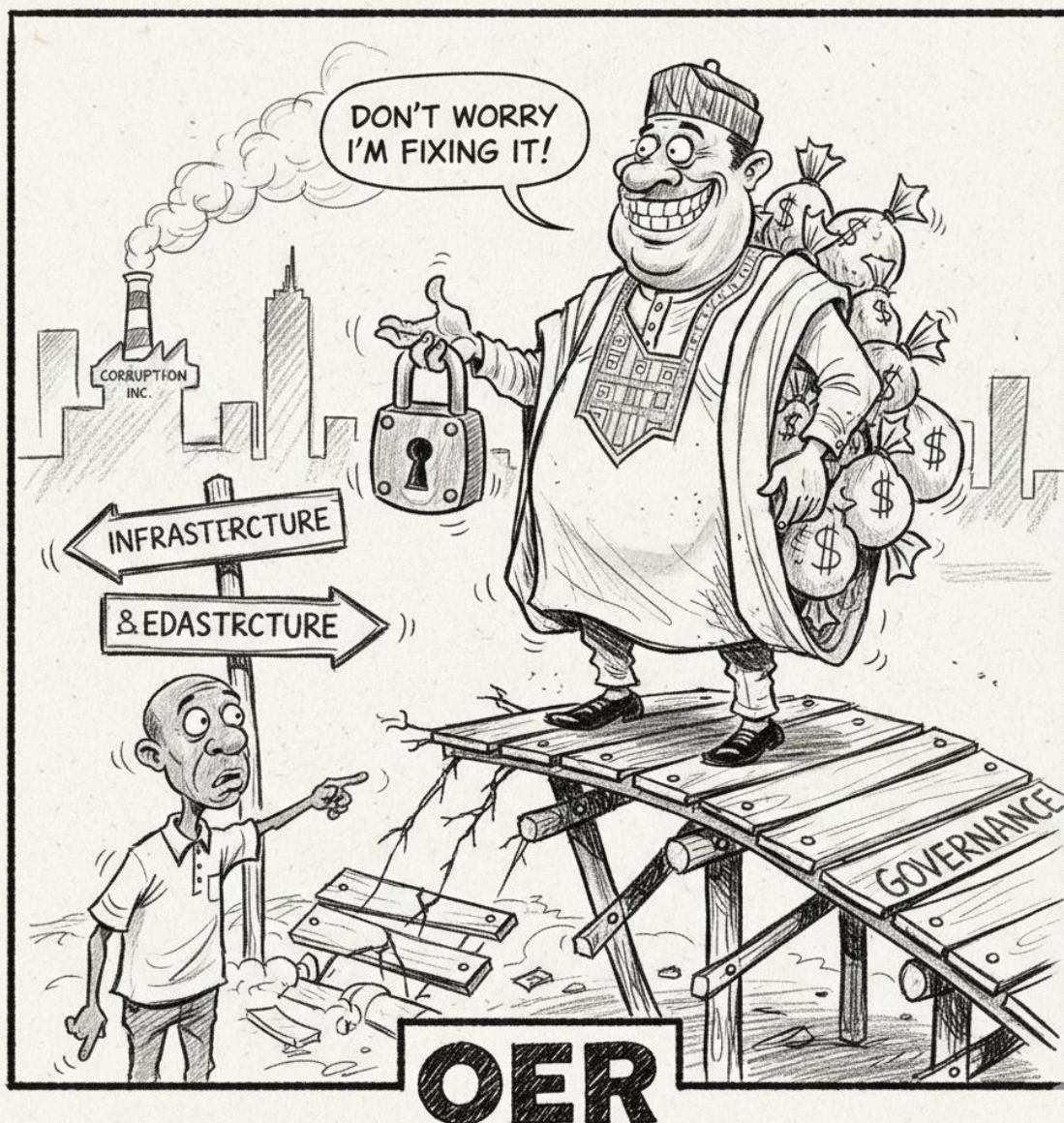

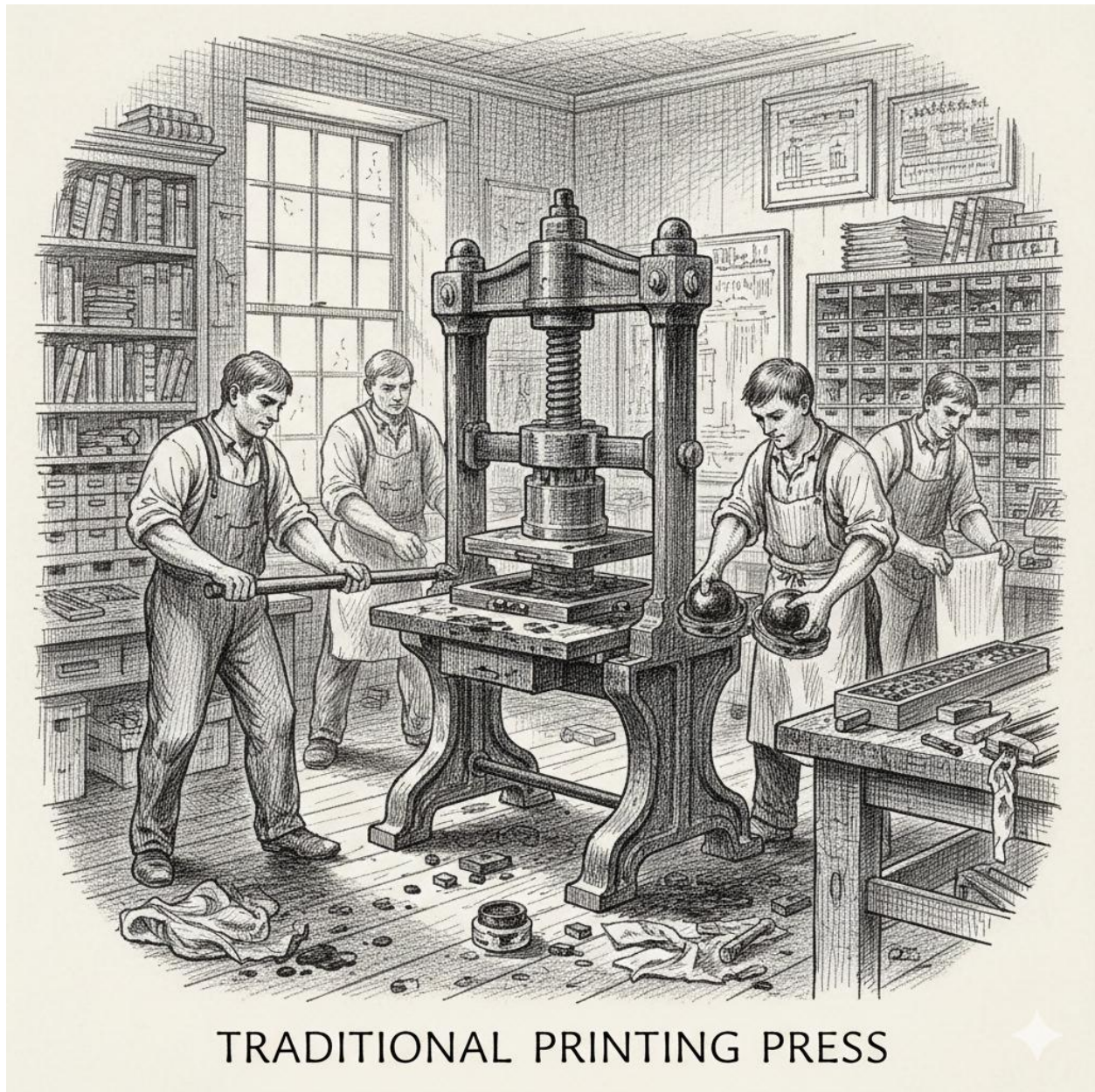

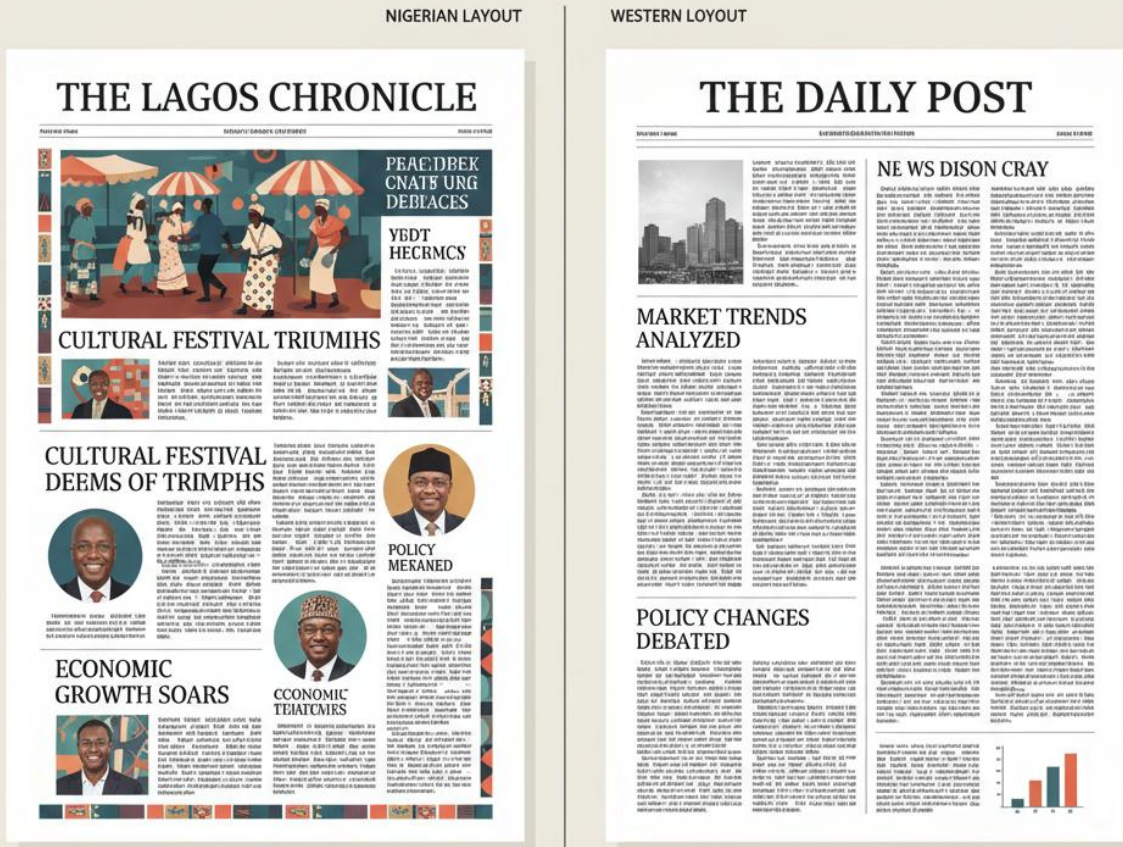
1.4.2 Comparative analysis of Nigerian and international practices
