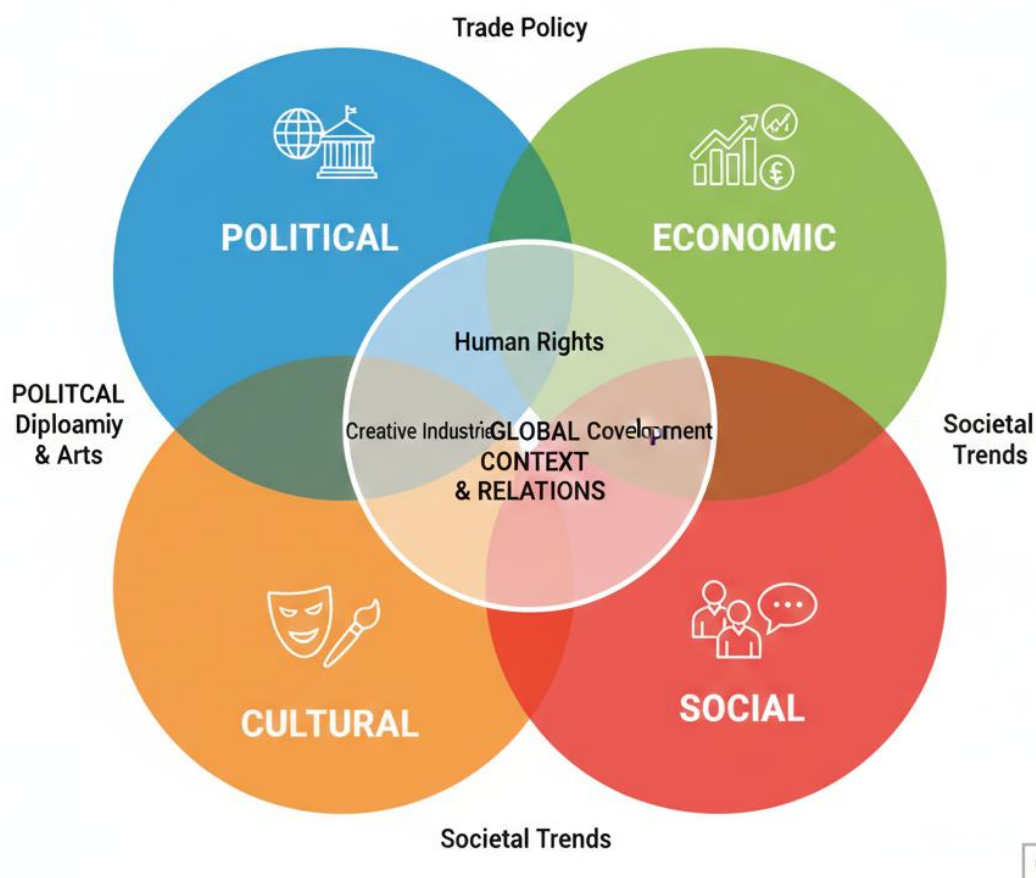
1.1 Defining Foreign Correspondence

1.2 Roles And Responsibilities Of Foreign Correspondents

1.2.1 Core duties in reporting international news

A **foreign correspondent** is tasked with gathering, verifying, and reporting news from outside their home country. Their core duties include monitoring political developments, covering economic changes, reporting on cultural events, and providing analysis of international conflicts. They must ensure accuracy, balance, and timeliness in their reporting, often working under pressure in unfamiliar environments.

1.2.2 Ethical considerations and professional standards

Ethics in journalism refers to the principles that guide professional conduct. For foreign correspondents, ethical considerations include fairness, respect for cultural differences,



avoidance of bias, and protection of sources. Professional standards also require adherence to codes of conduct established by media organisations and press associations. These standards safeguard credibility and trust, which are essential for international reporting.

Ethical Principles for Foreign Correspondents
Cultural Sensitivity: Understanding and respecting the local customs, traditions, and socio-political context of the host country to avoid biased or stereotypical reporting.
Safety and Protection: Prioritizing the physical safety of both the reporting team and local fixers or sources, ensuring that no story is worth a life.
Accountability to the Subject: Ensuring that the voices of the local population are accurately represented and not exploited for sensationalist narratives.
Independence from Influence: Maintaining strict neutrality and resisting pressure from host governments, corporate interests, or even one's home country's foreign policy.

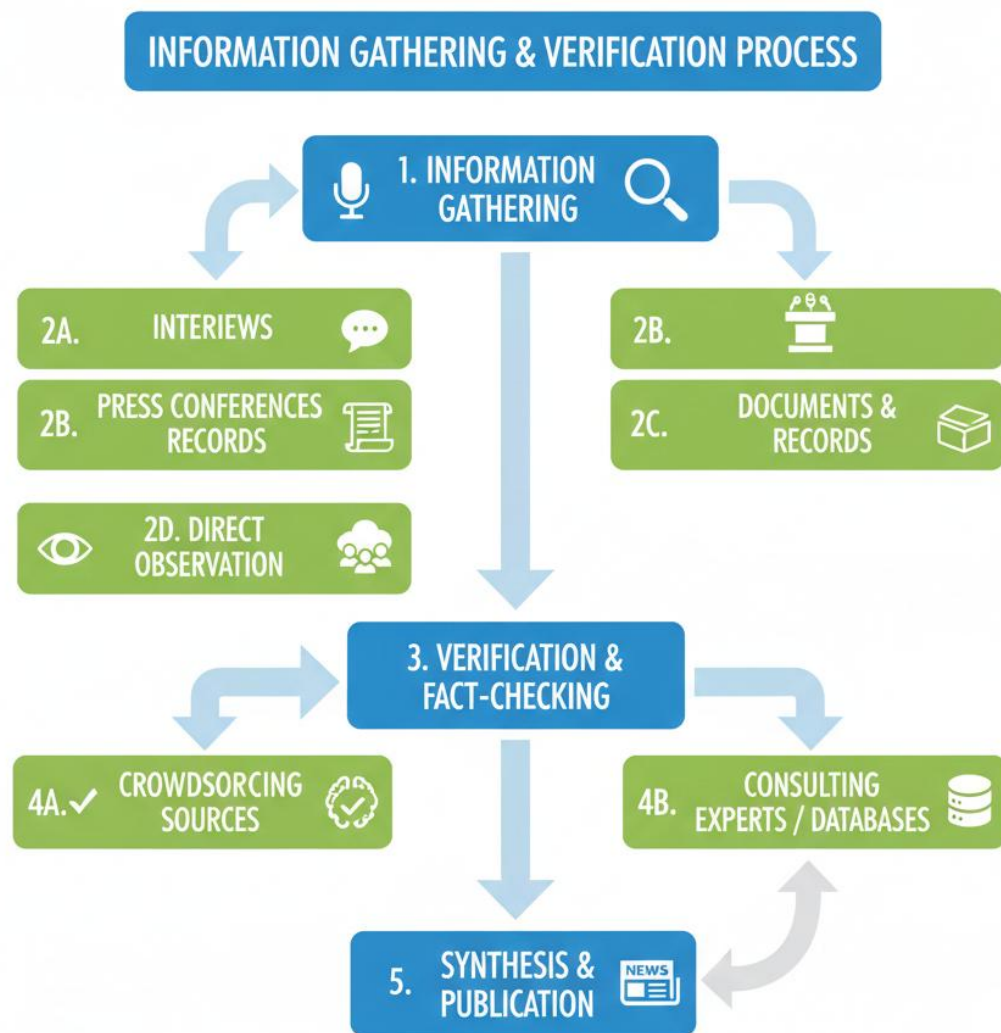

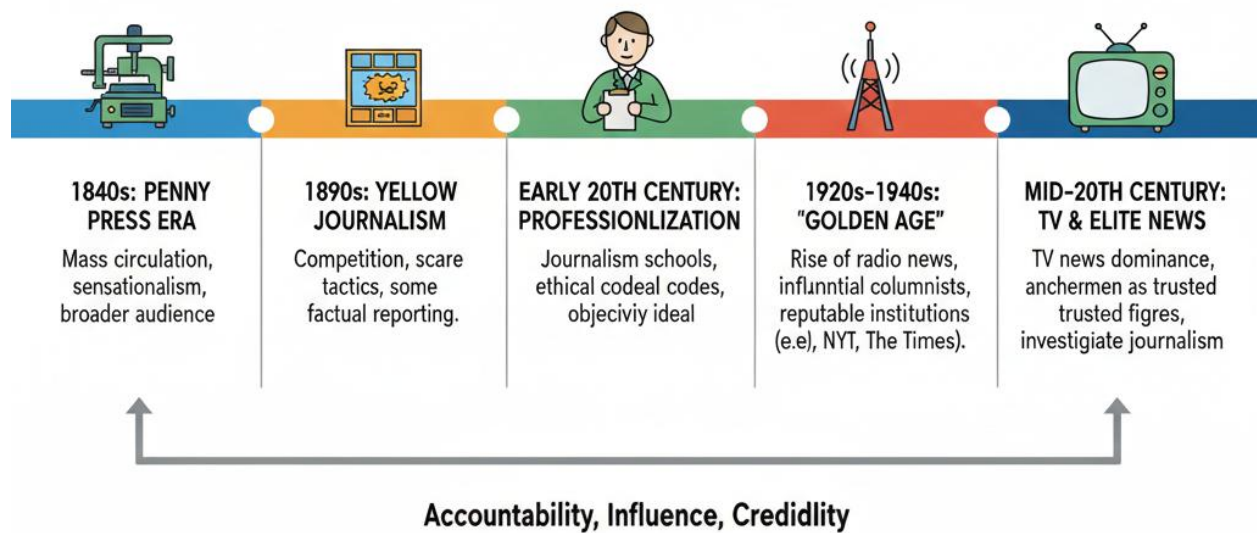
2.1 Emergence Of The Elite Press Corps

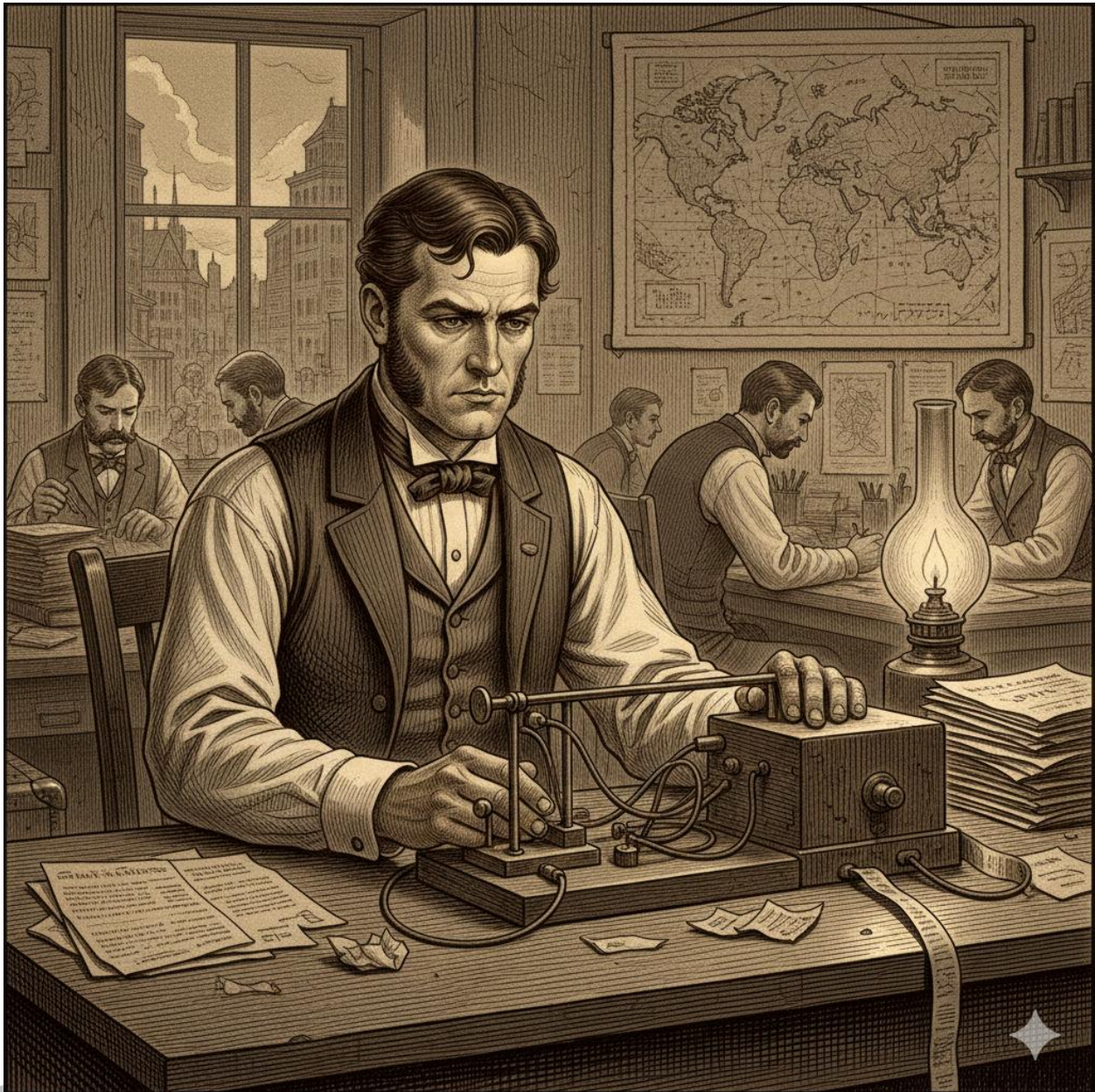

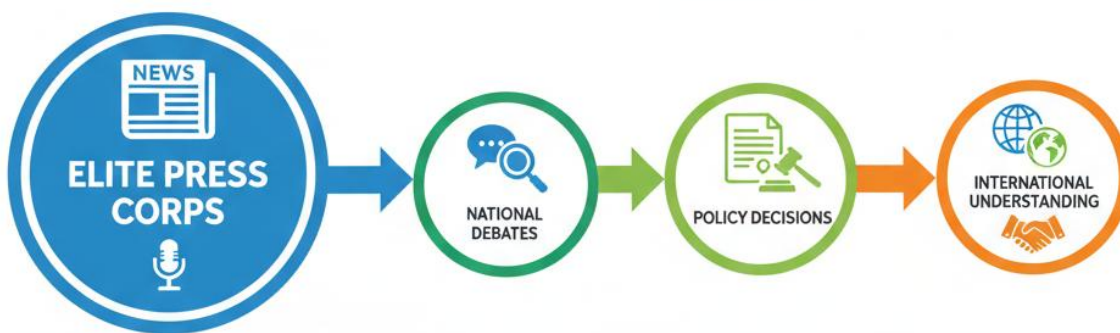

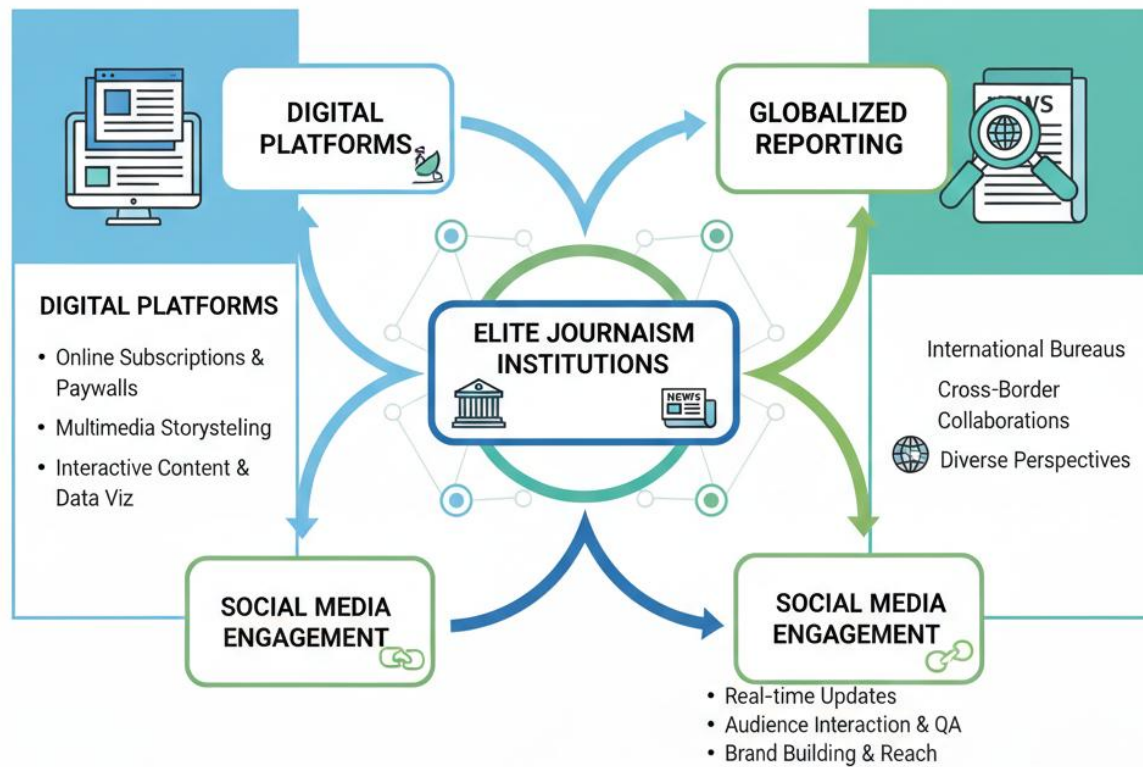

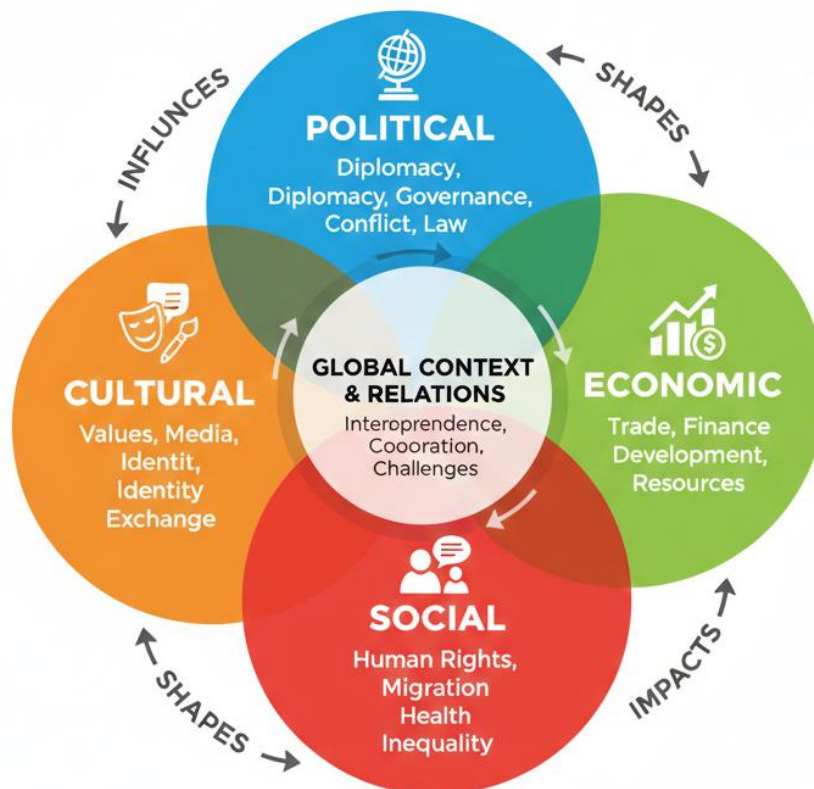

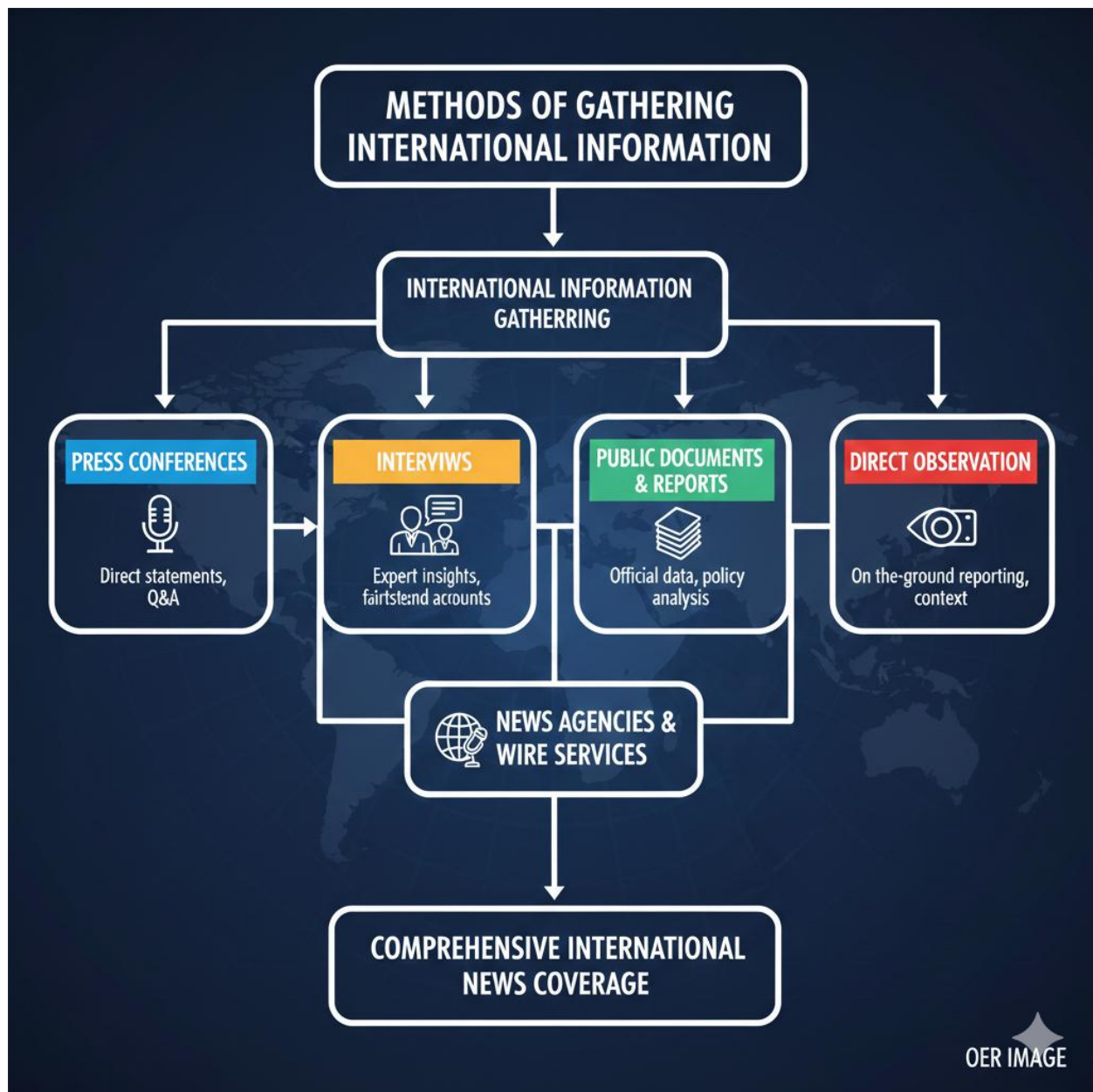

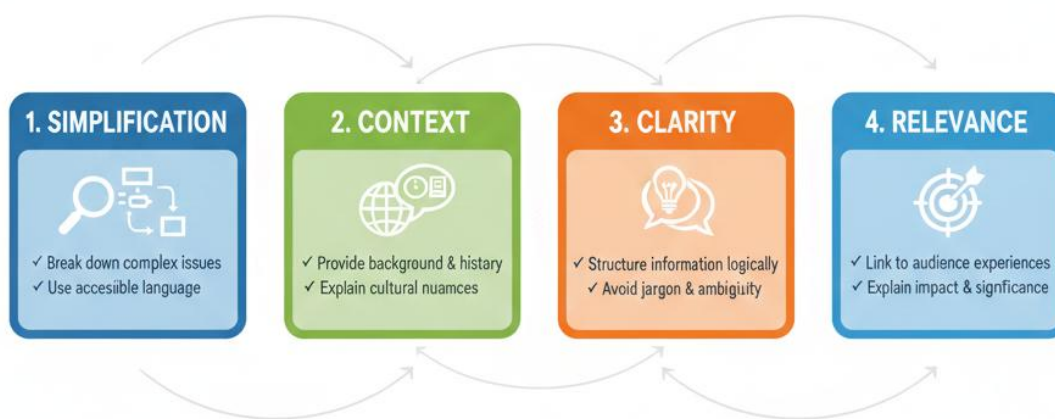

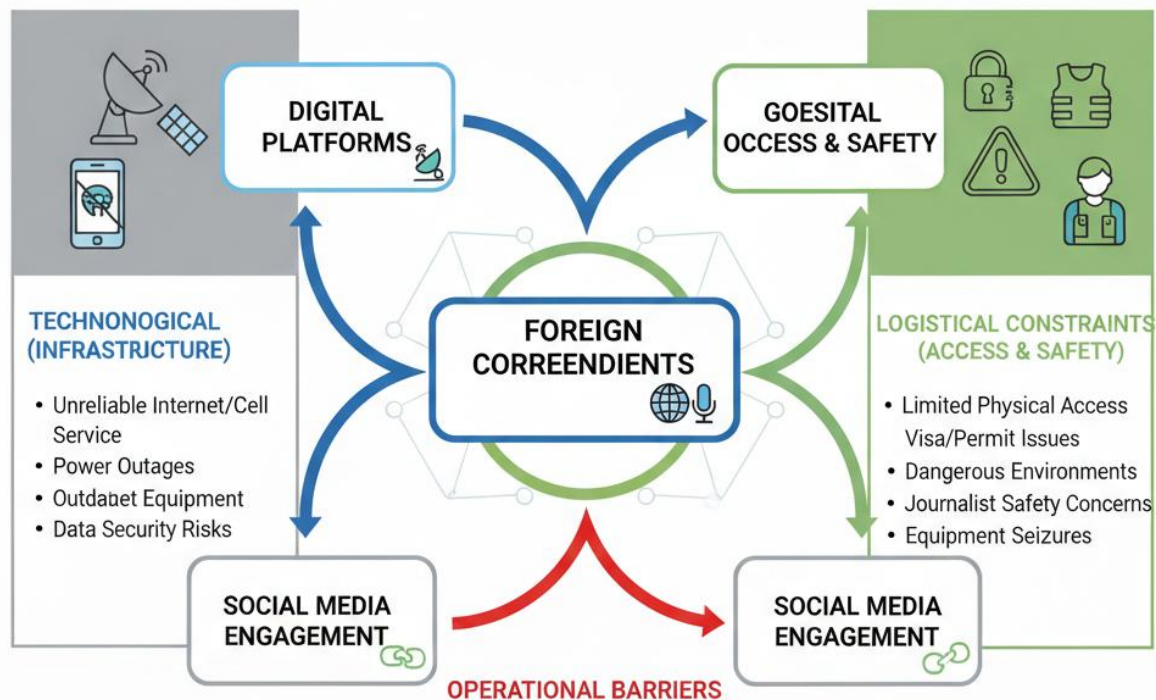

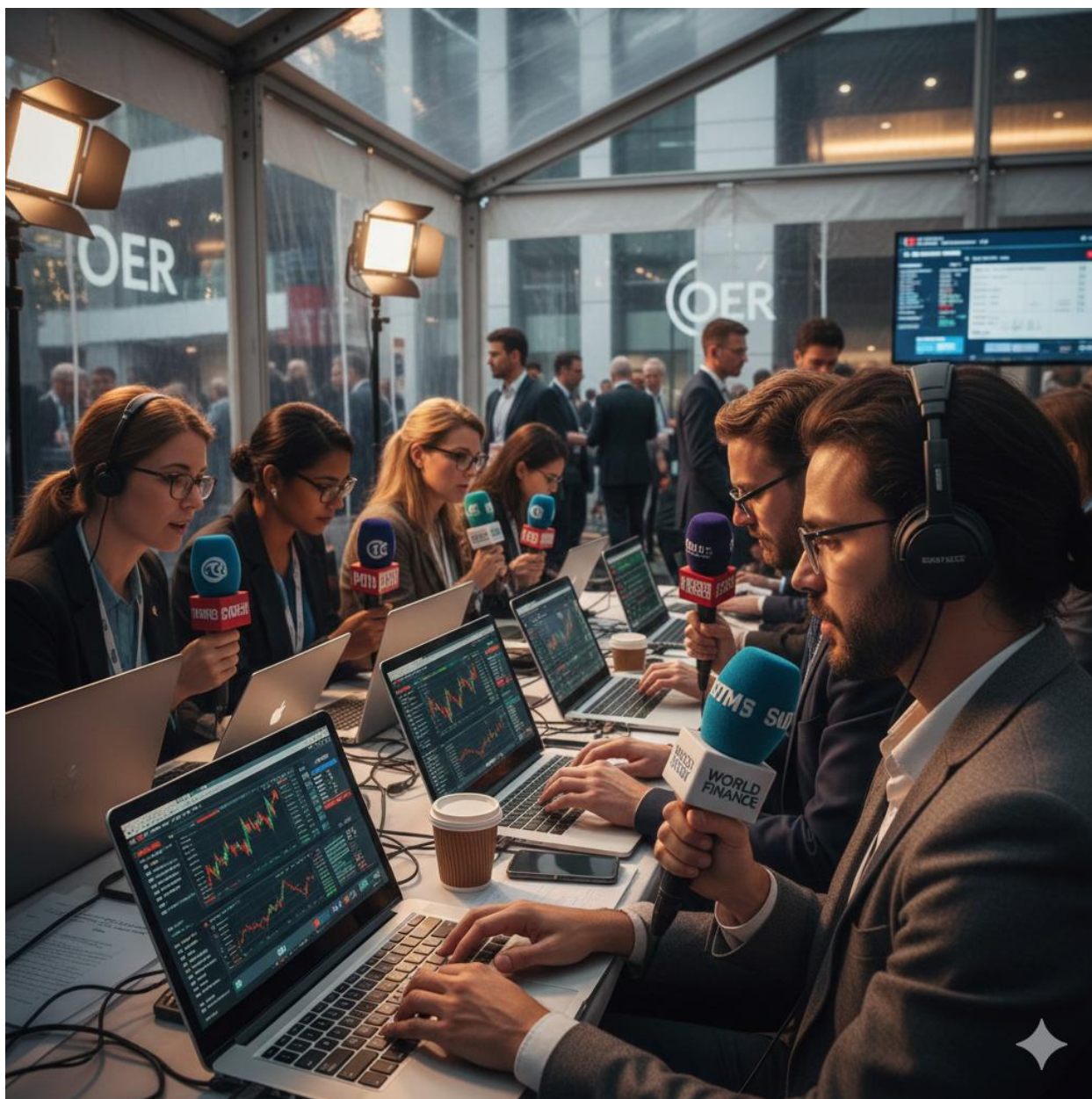

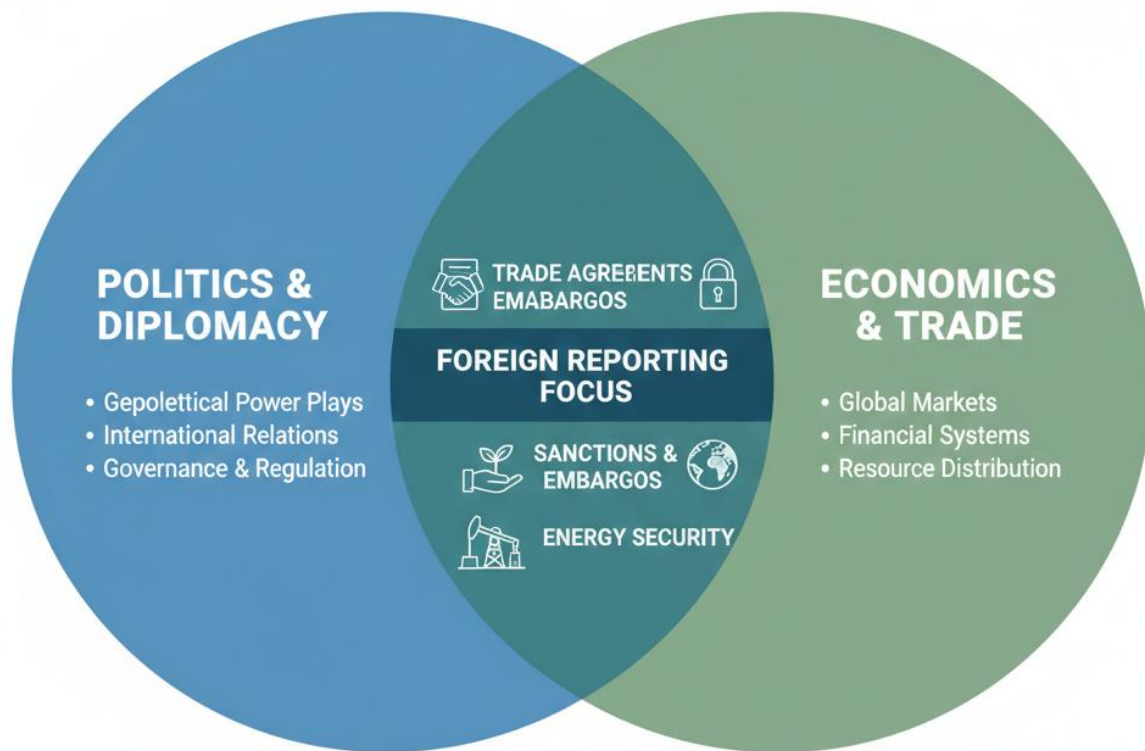

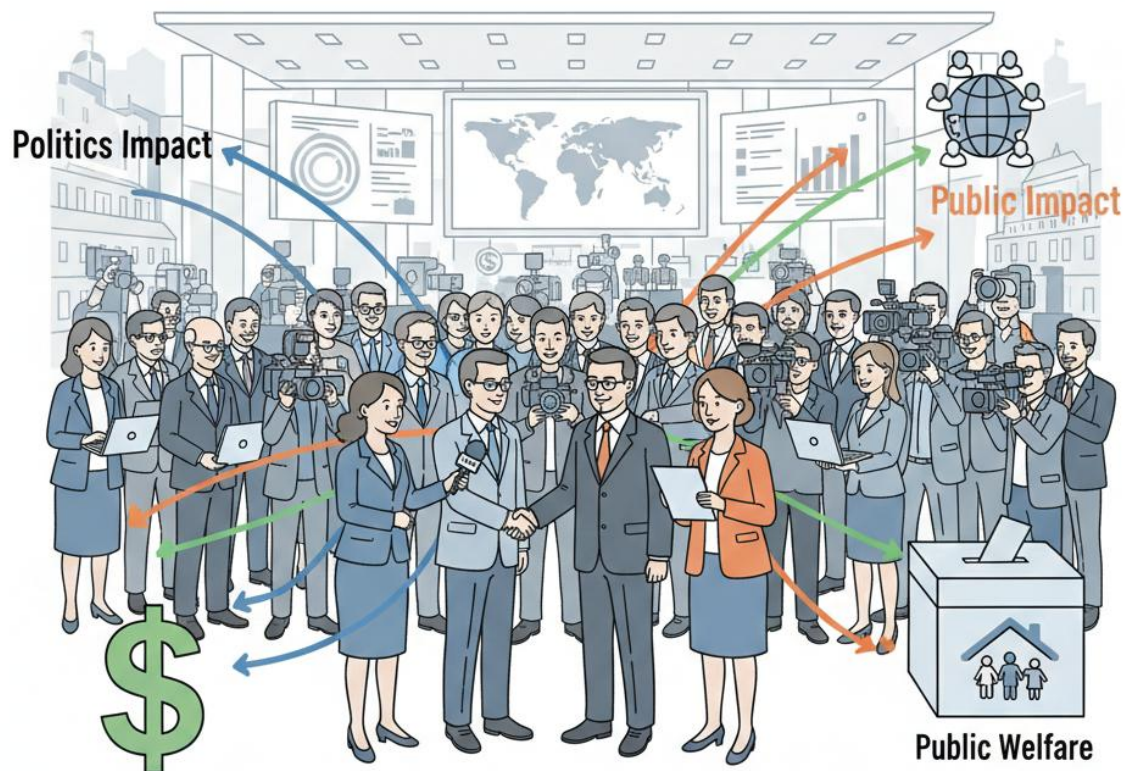

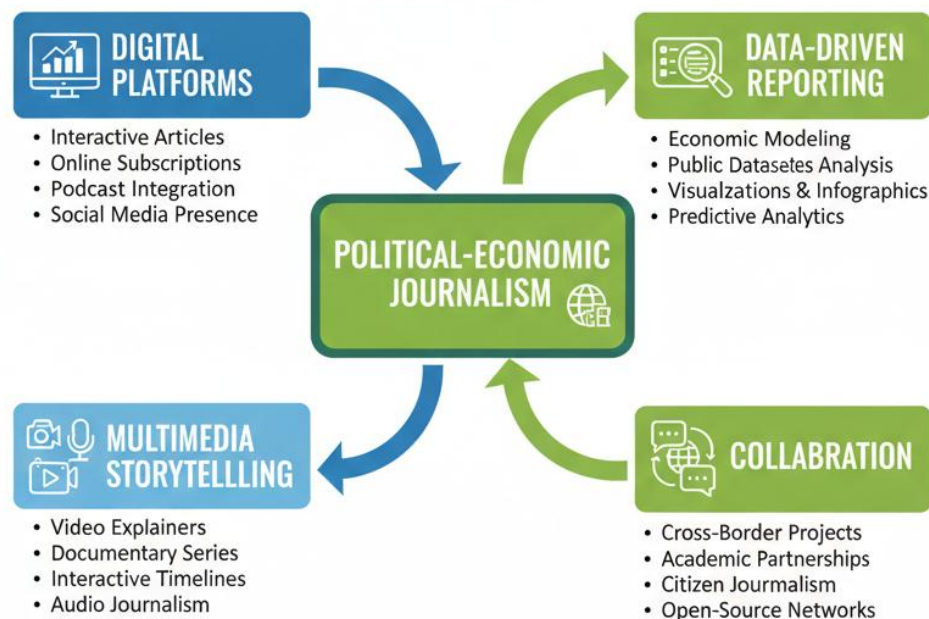

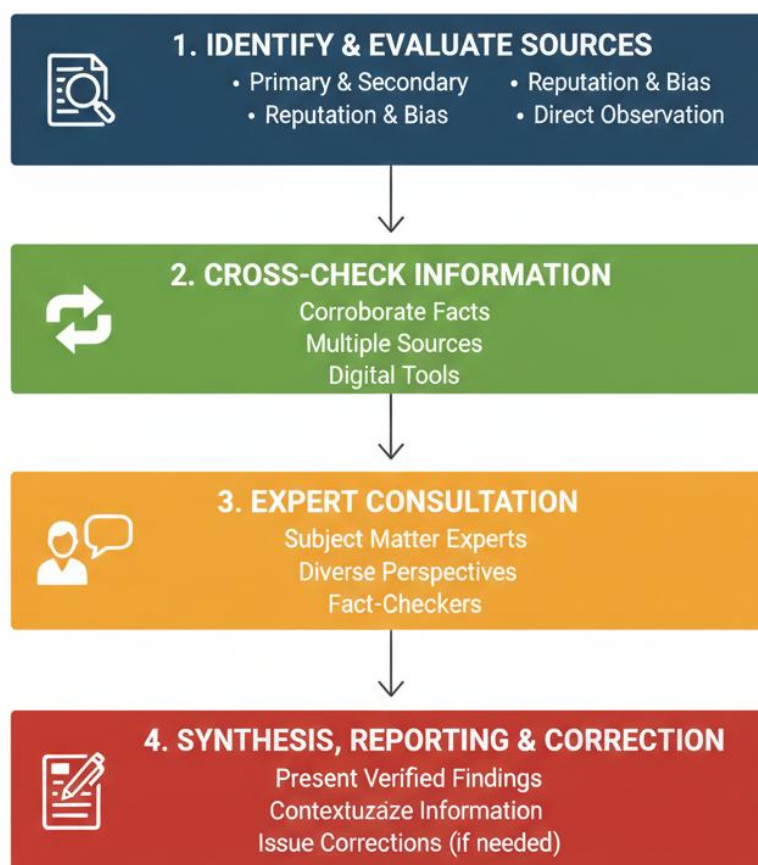

Figure 5.1 Research and verification skills of foreign correspondents

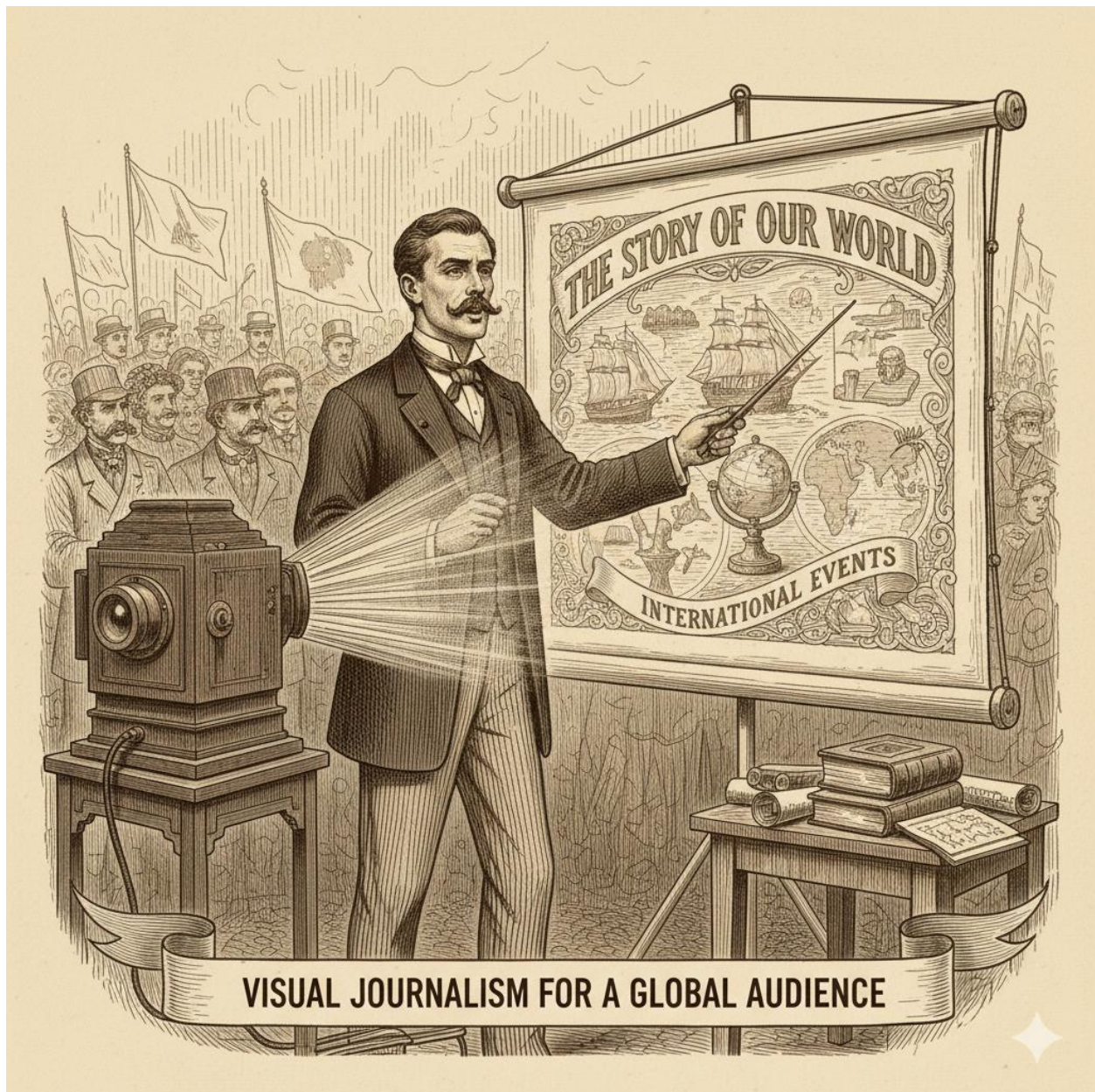

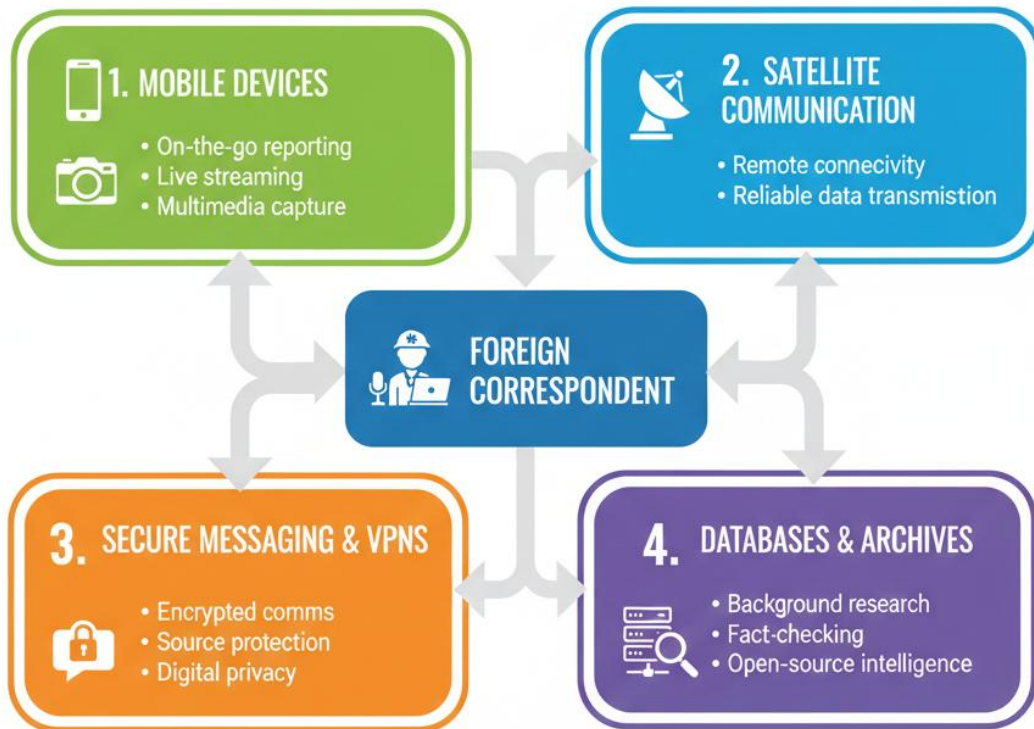
