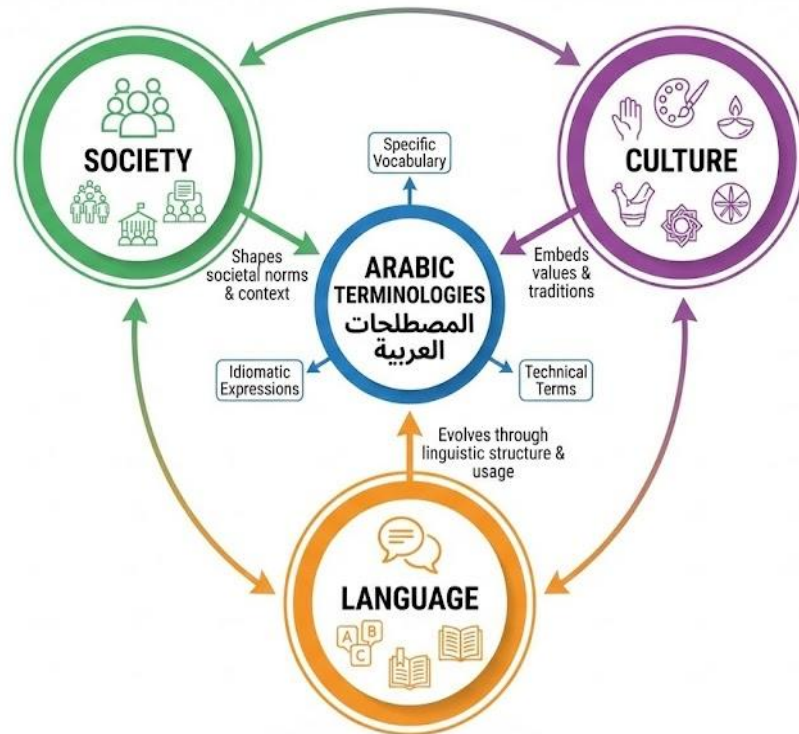


Figure 1.1 Relationship between society, culture, and language in Arabic terminologies

1.2 Expressions in Contemporary Arabic Prose

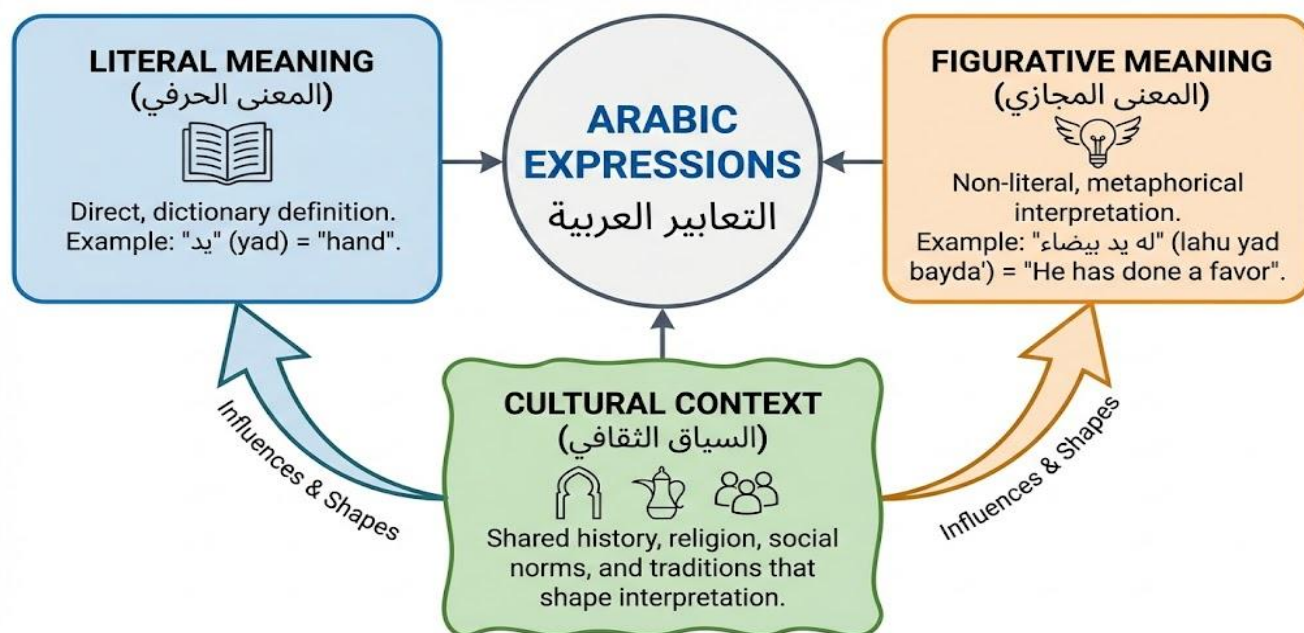


Figure 1.2 Relationship between literal, figurative, and cultural meaning in Arabic expressions

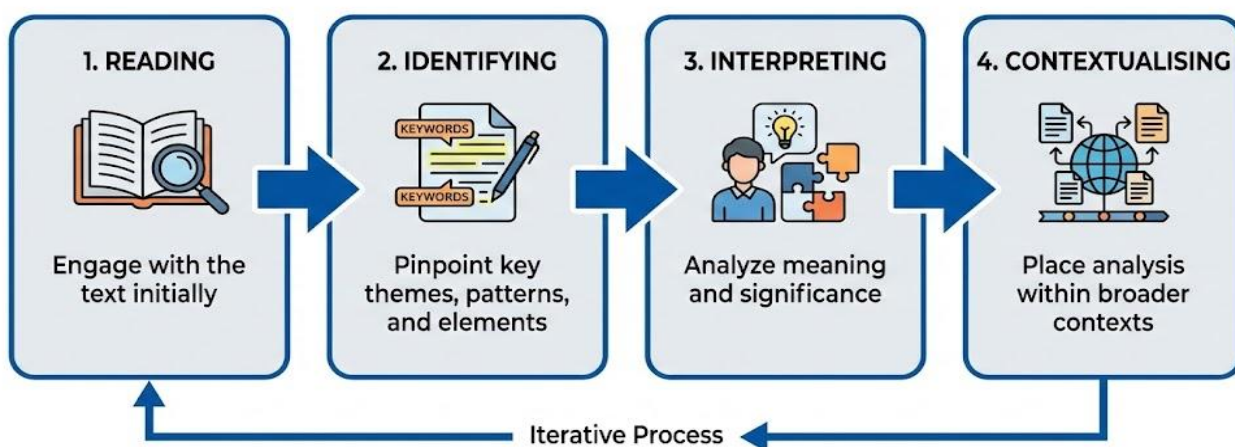


Figure 1.3 Steps in textual analysis of Arabic prose

1.3.3 Exercises for recognising and applying expressions

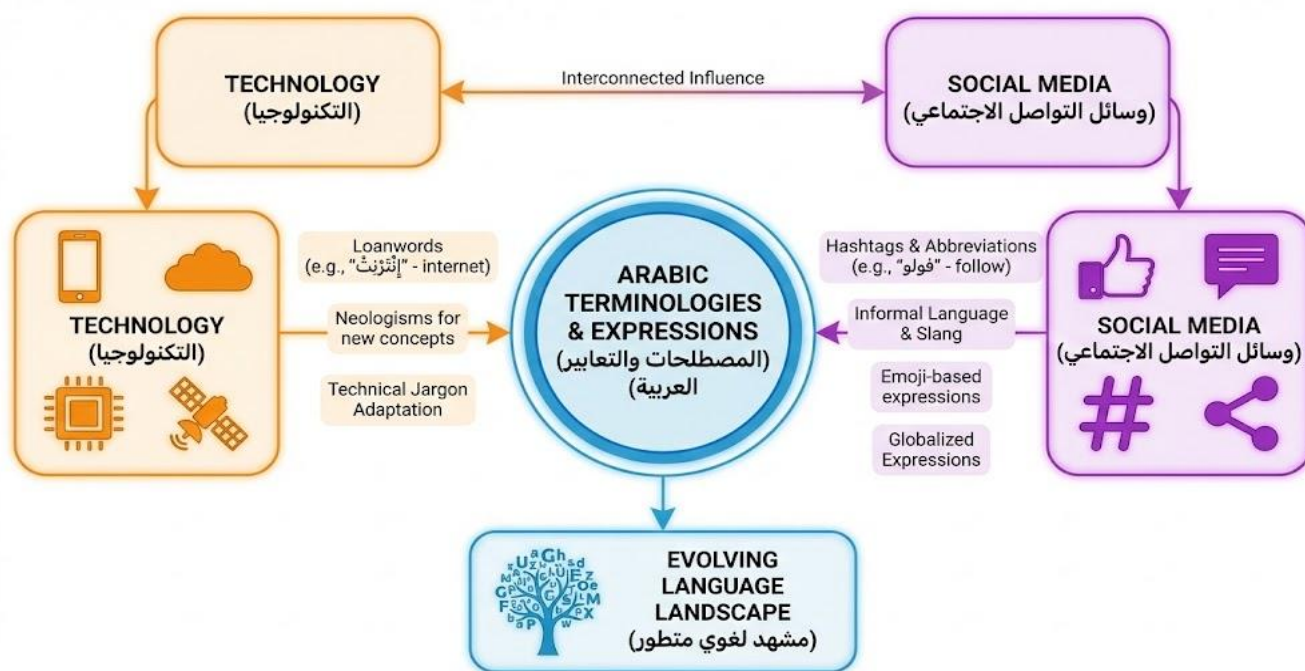


Figure 1.4 Influence of technology and social media on Arabic prose



1.4.2 Dialectal variations and their effect on expressions

2.1 Foundations of Contemporary Arabic Literature

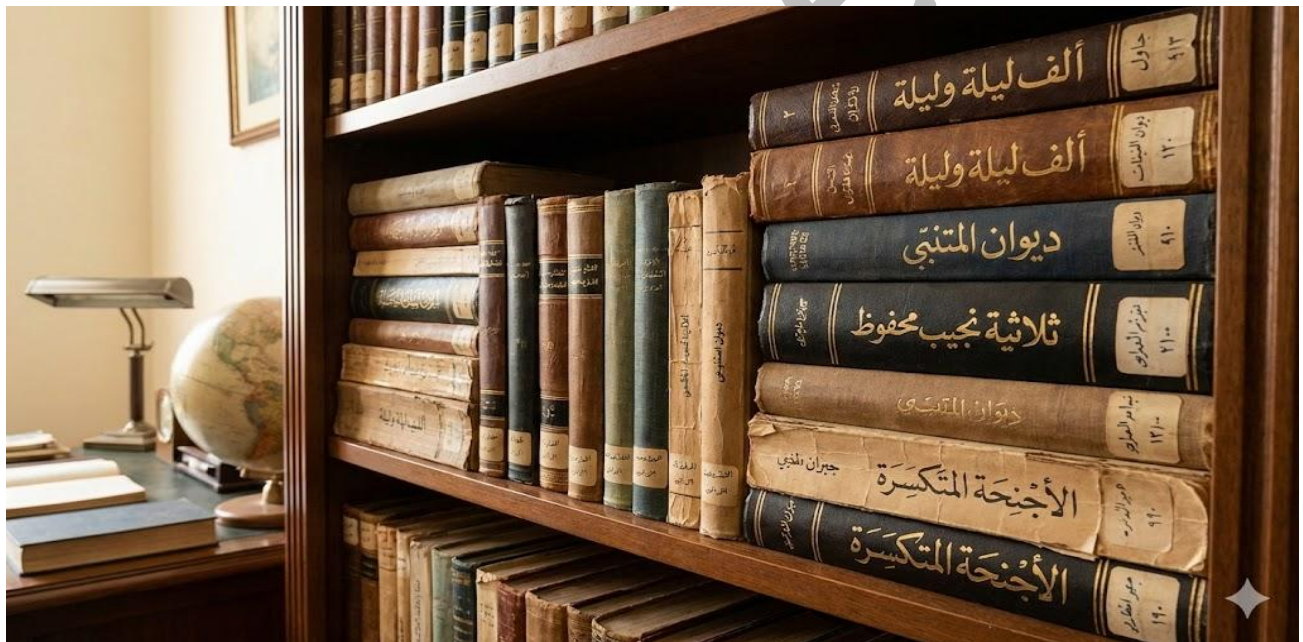


Plate 2.1 Early Arabic literary works illustrating modern evolution

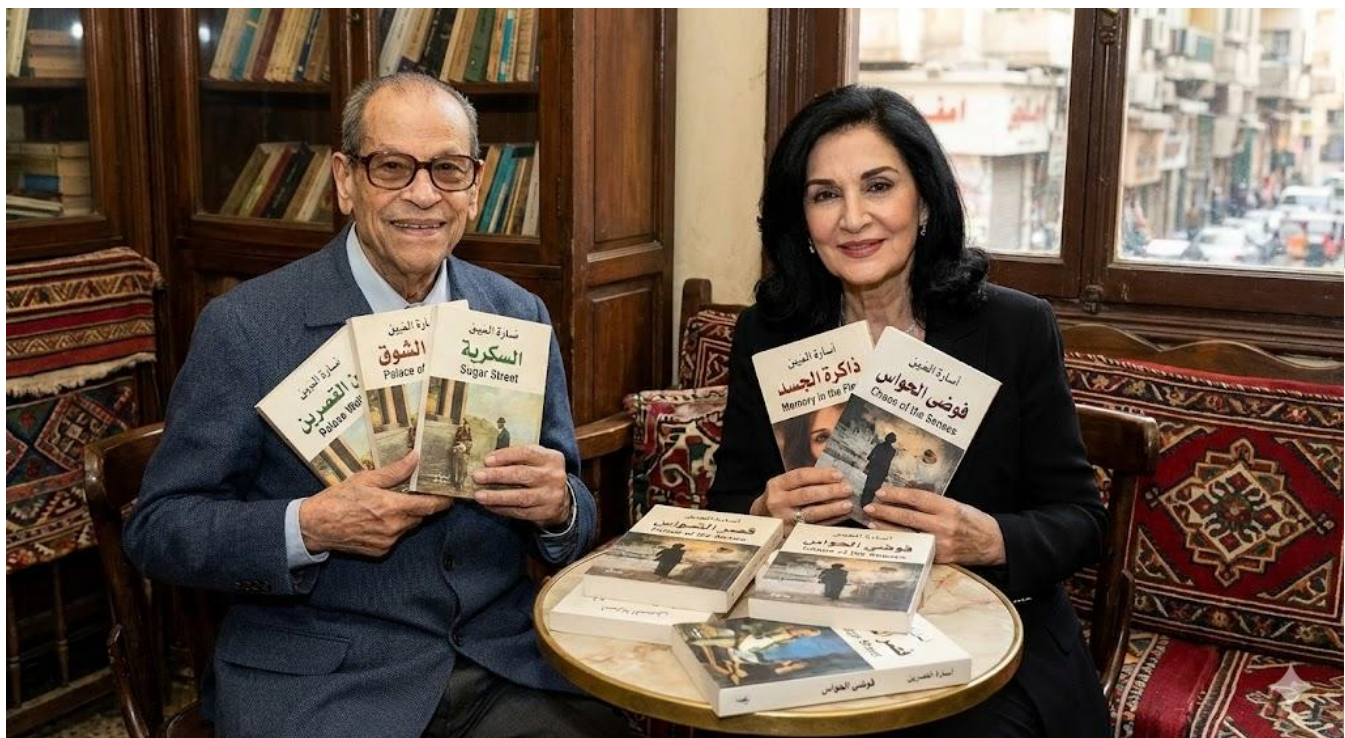


Plate 2.2 Prominent contemporary Arabic novelists and their works

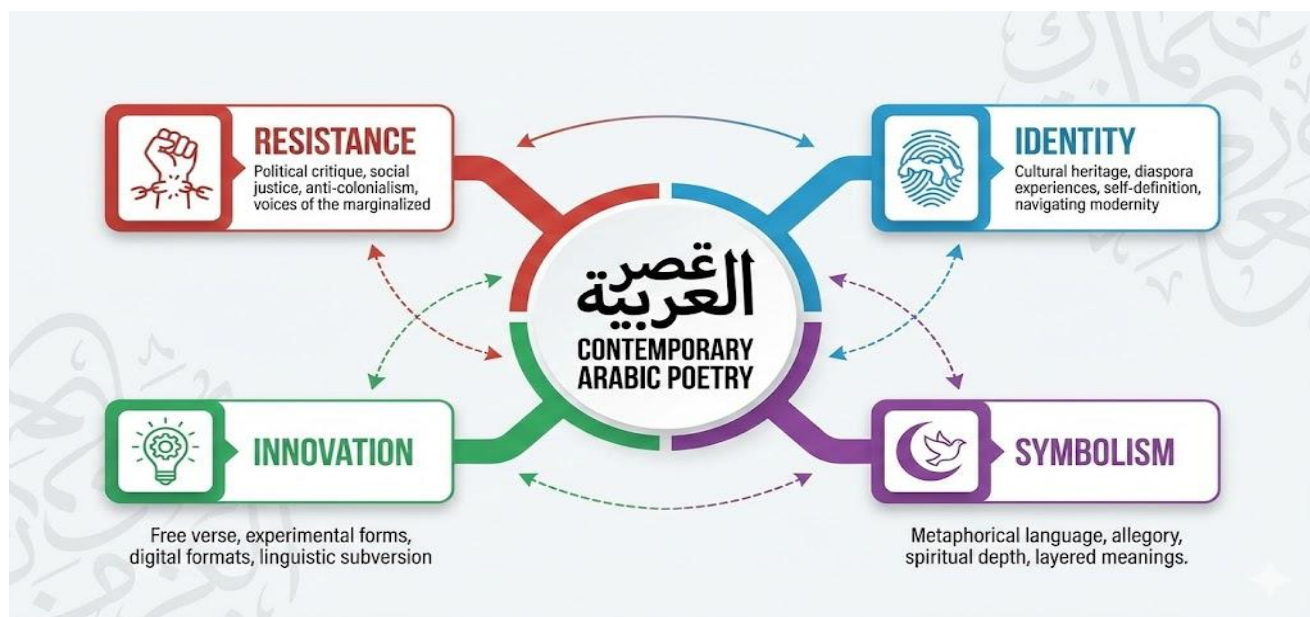


Figure 2.2 Contributions of contemporary Arabic poets

2.3 Literary Techniques and Styles

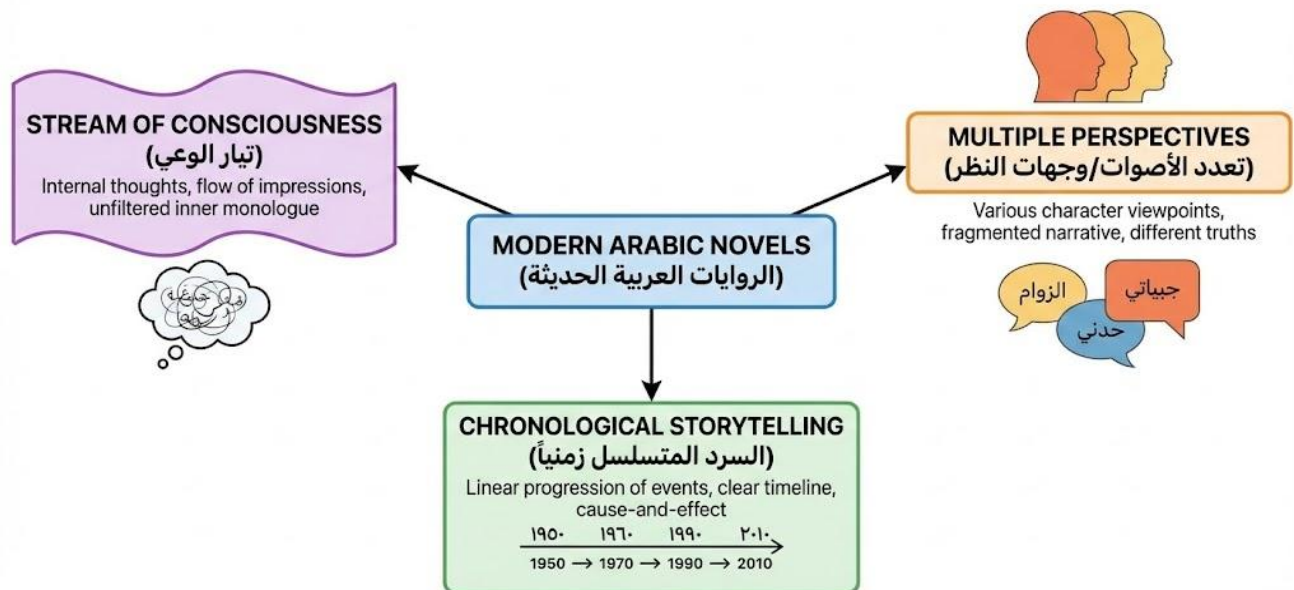


Figure 2.3 Narrative techniques in modern Arabic novels

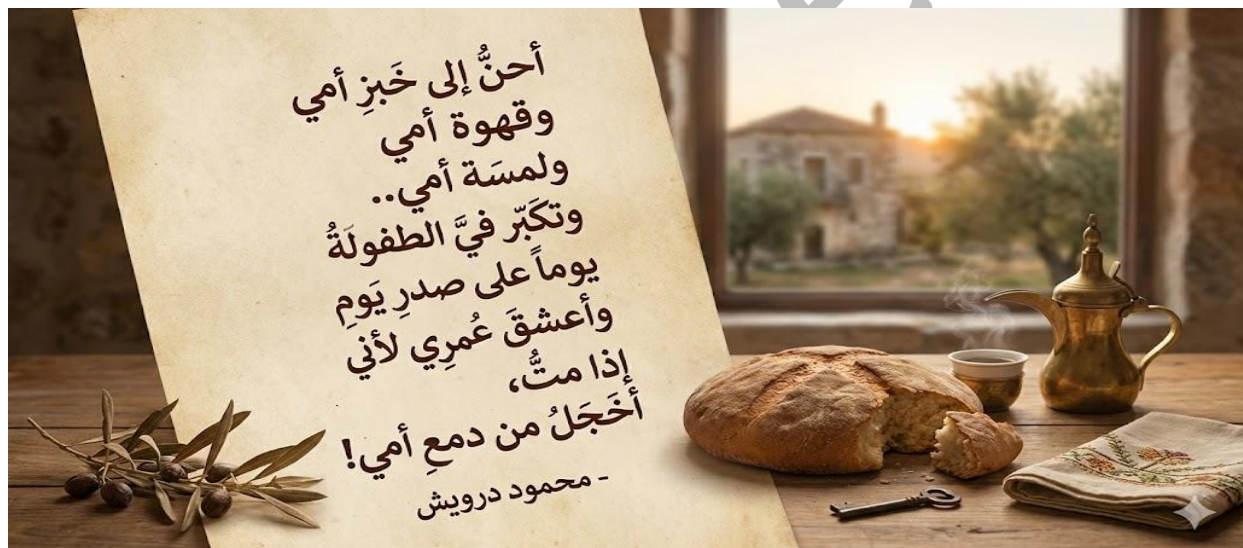


Plate 2.3 Example of free verse in contemporary Arabic poetry

2.3.3 Symbolism and cultural references in prose

الرمزية (symbolism) refers to the use of objects, characters, or events to represent abstract ideas, while الإشارات الثقافية (cultural references) are allusions to traditions, history, or shared experiences within society. In contemporary Arabic prose, symbolism is often used to critique political realities or explore existential questions. Cultural references, on the other hand, anchor the text in familiar contexts, making it resonate with readers.



For example, the image of النخلة (the palm tree) may symbolise resilience, while references to historical events such as النكبة (the Nakba) evoke collective memory.

2.4 Critical Appreciation and Reader Engagement

2.4.1 Methods of literary analysis and critique

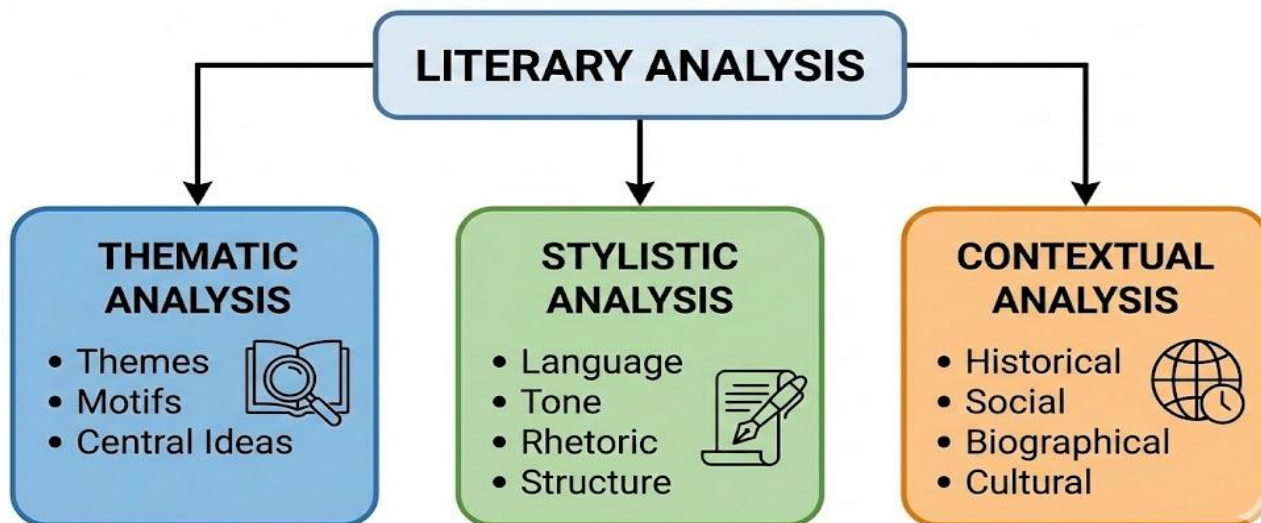


Figure 2.4 Methods of literary analysis in Arabic literature

2.4.2 Reader response and interpretation of texts

2.4.3 Contemporary challenges in appreciating Arabic literature

3.1 Foundations of Modern Arabic Prose

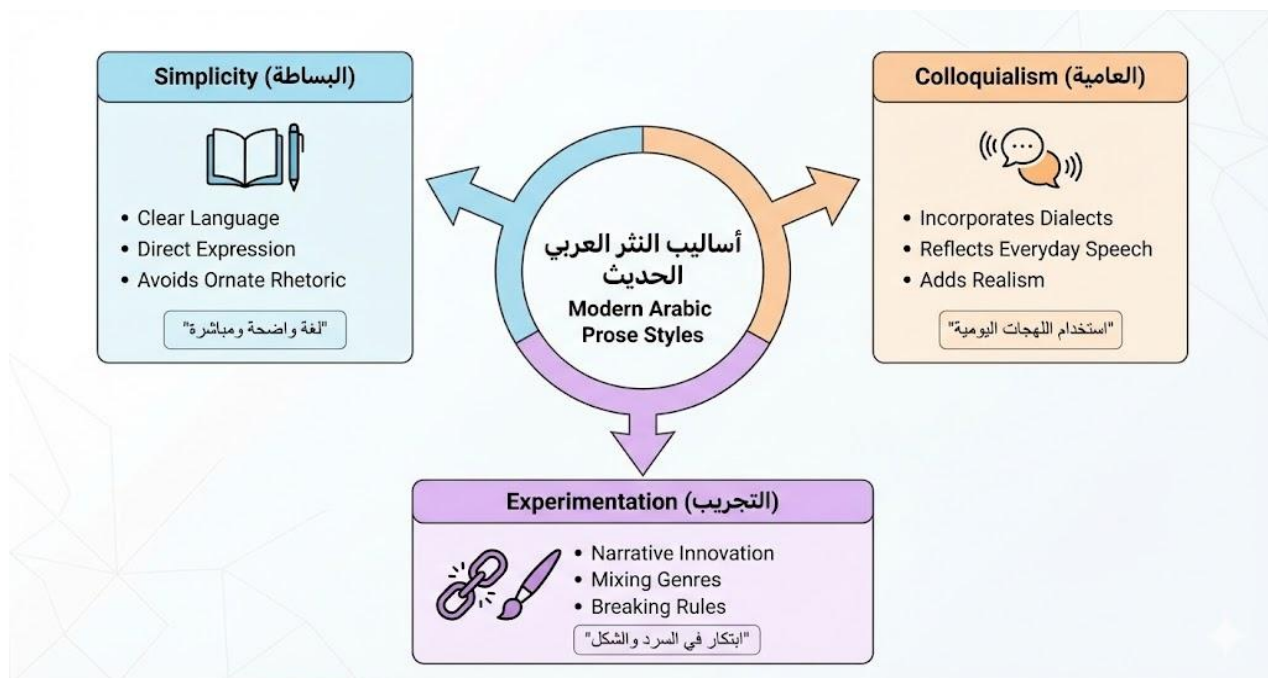


Figure 3.3 Stylistic features of modern Arabic prose

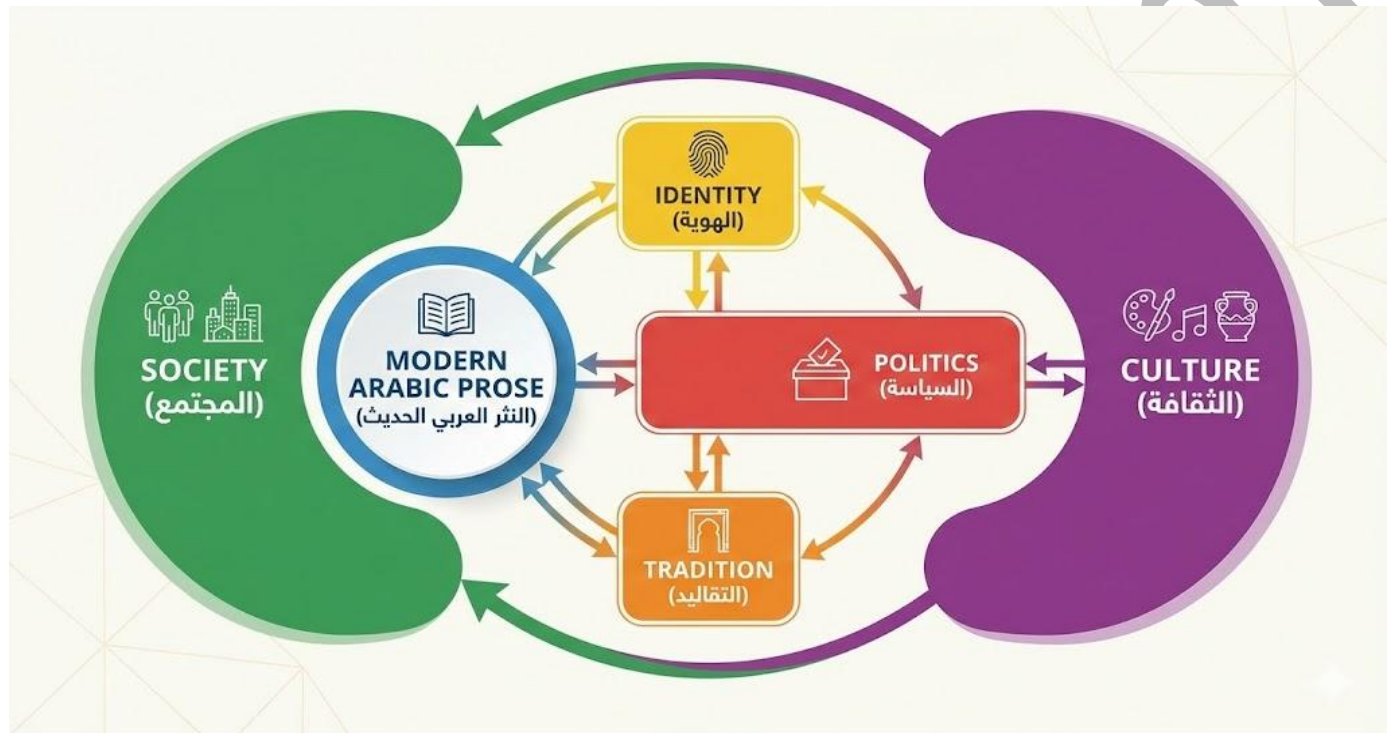


Figure 3.5 Prose as a reflection of society and culture

4.1 Foundations of Dialectal Influence

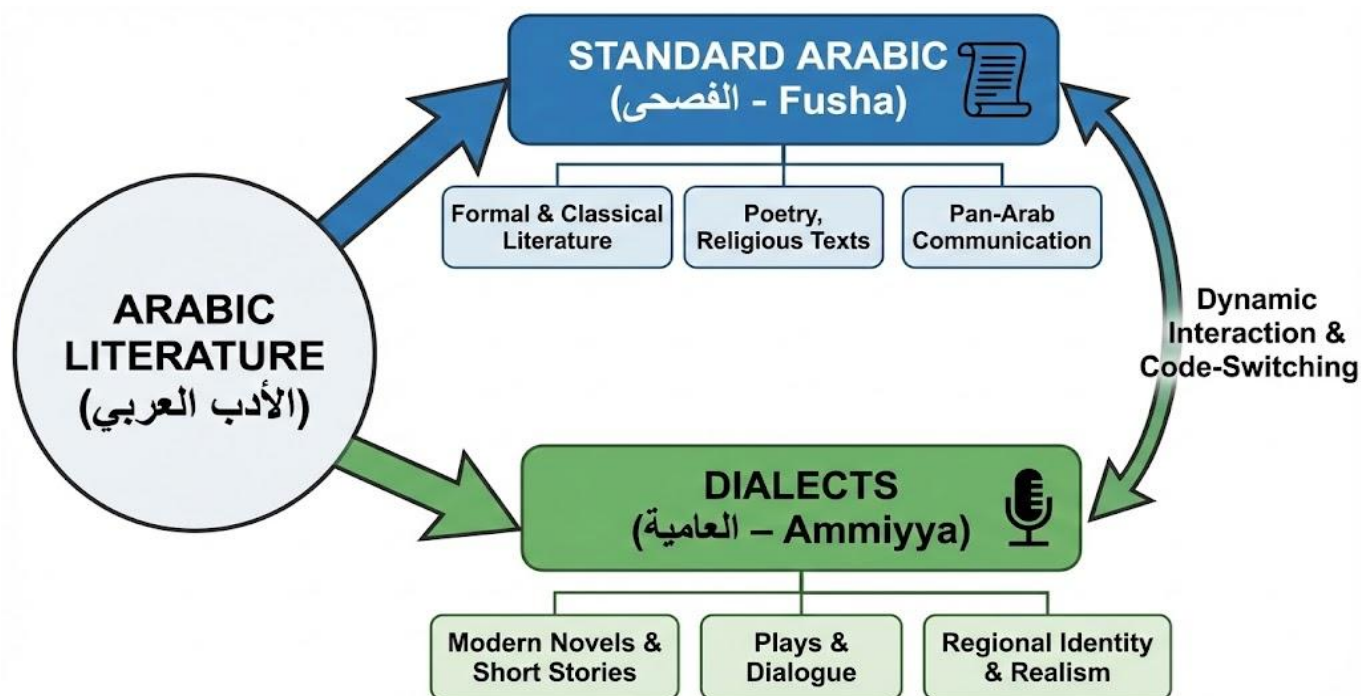


Figure 4.1 Relationship between Standard Arabic and dialects in Arabic literature

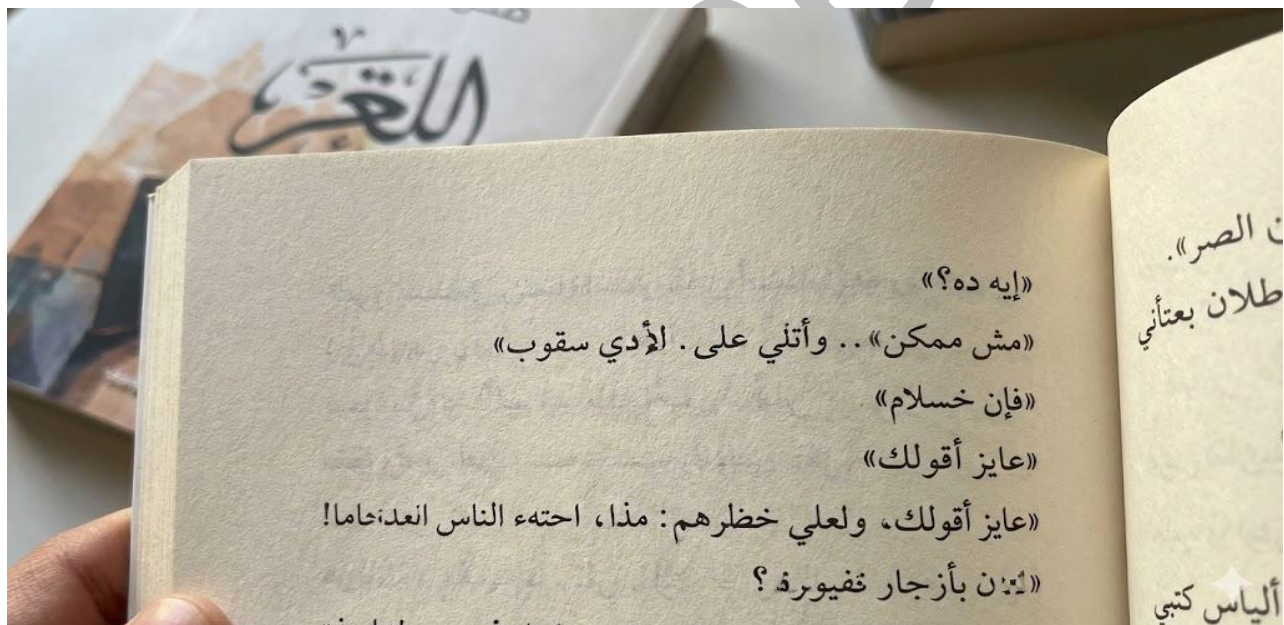


Plate 4.2 Use of dialects in Arabic novels

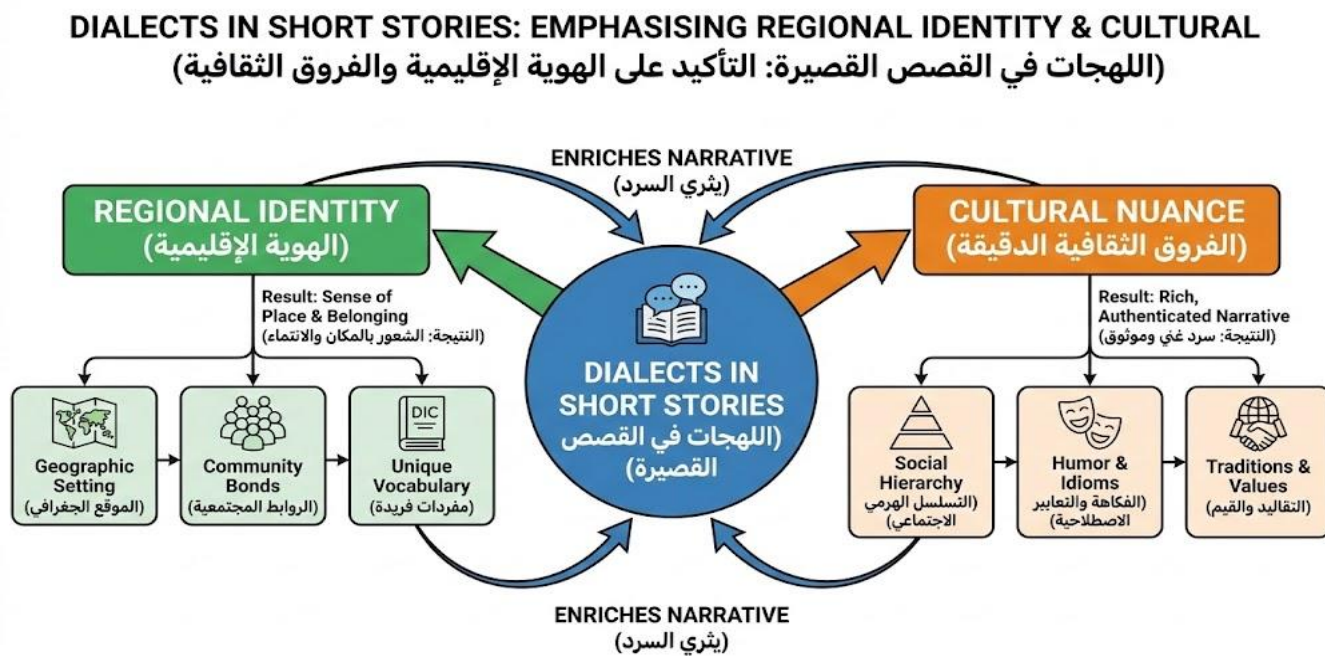


Figure 4.2 Dialects in short stories and regional identity

4.3 Features and Effects of Dialectal Usage

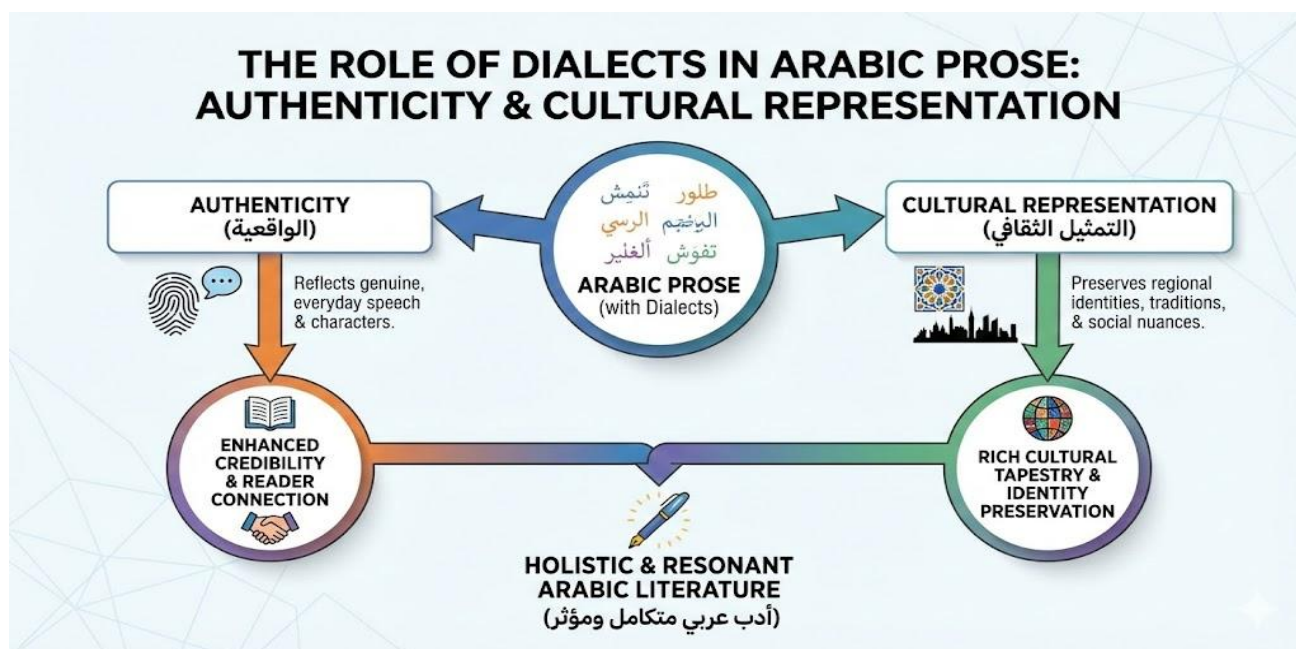


Figure 4.4 Authenticity and cultural representation through dialects

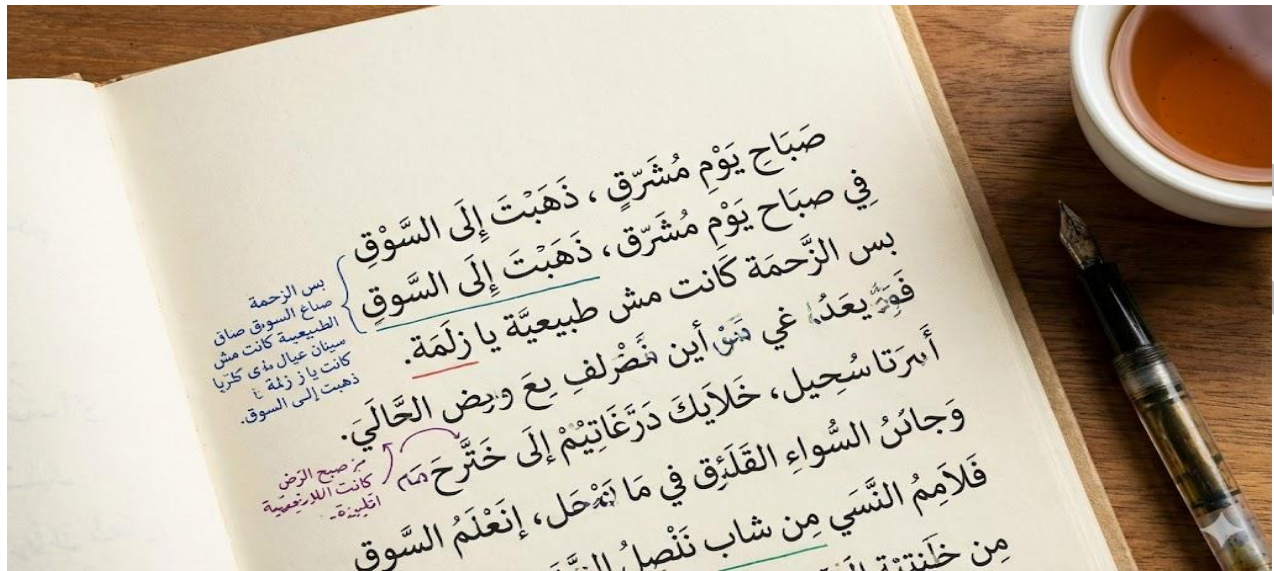


Plate 4.4 Stylistic innovations through dialectal blending

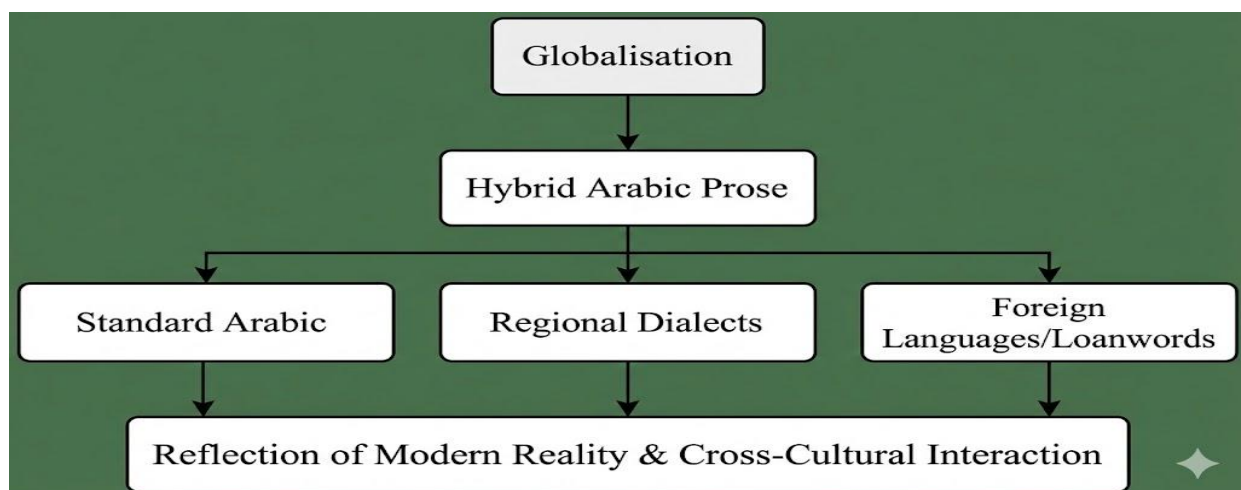


Figure 4.6 Globalisation and hybrid forms of Arabic prose

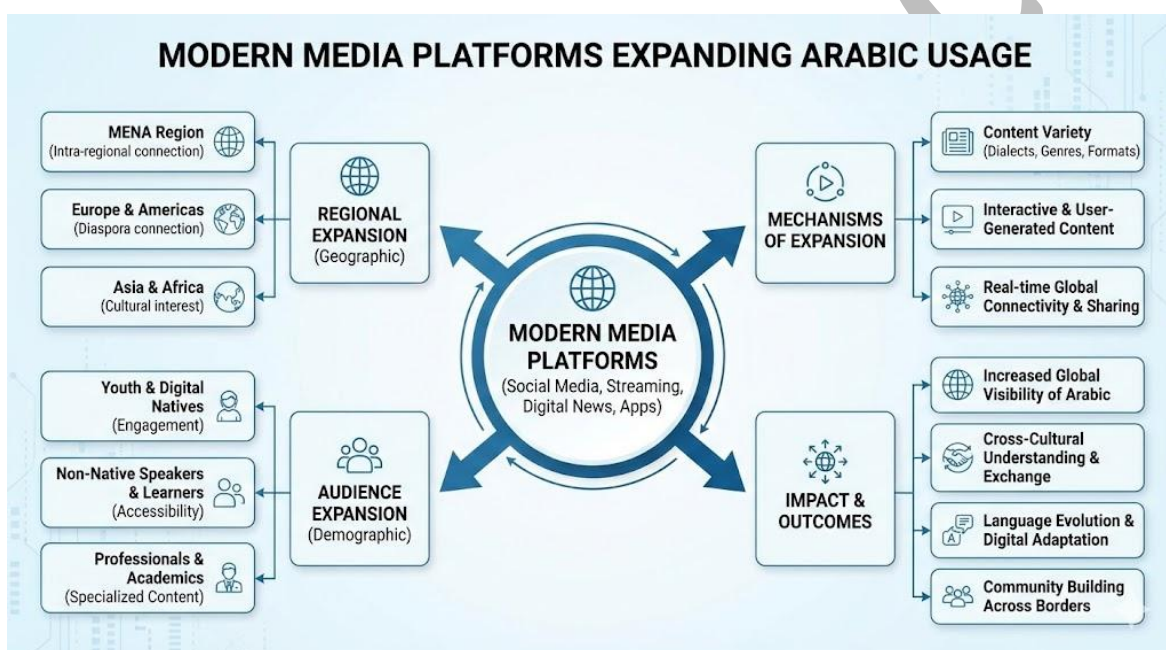


Figure 5.1 Modern media platforms and Arabic usage

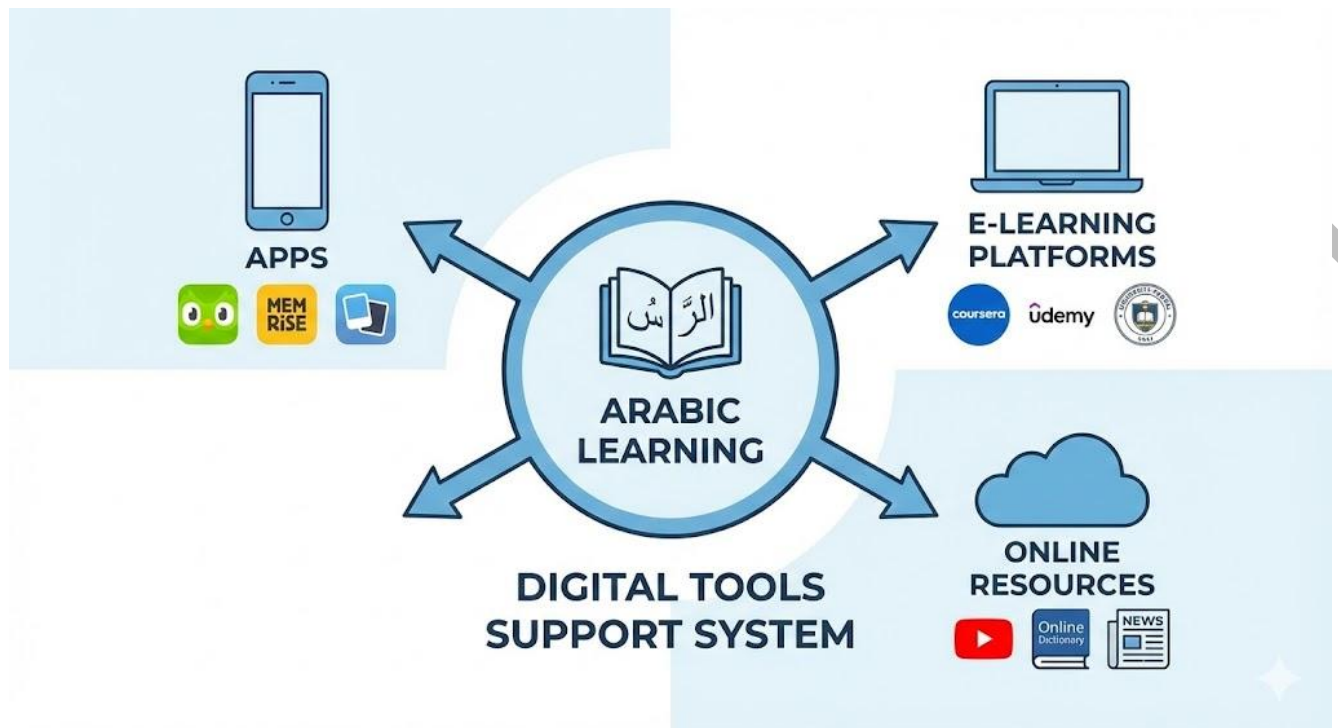


Figure 5.2 Digital tools for Arabic learning

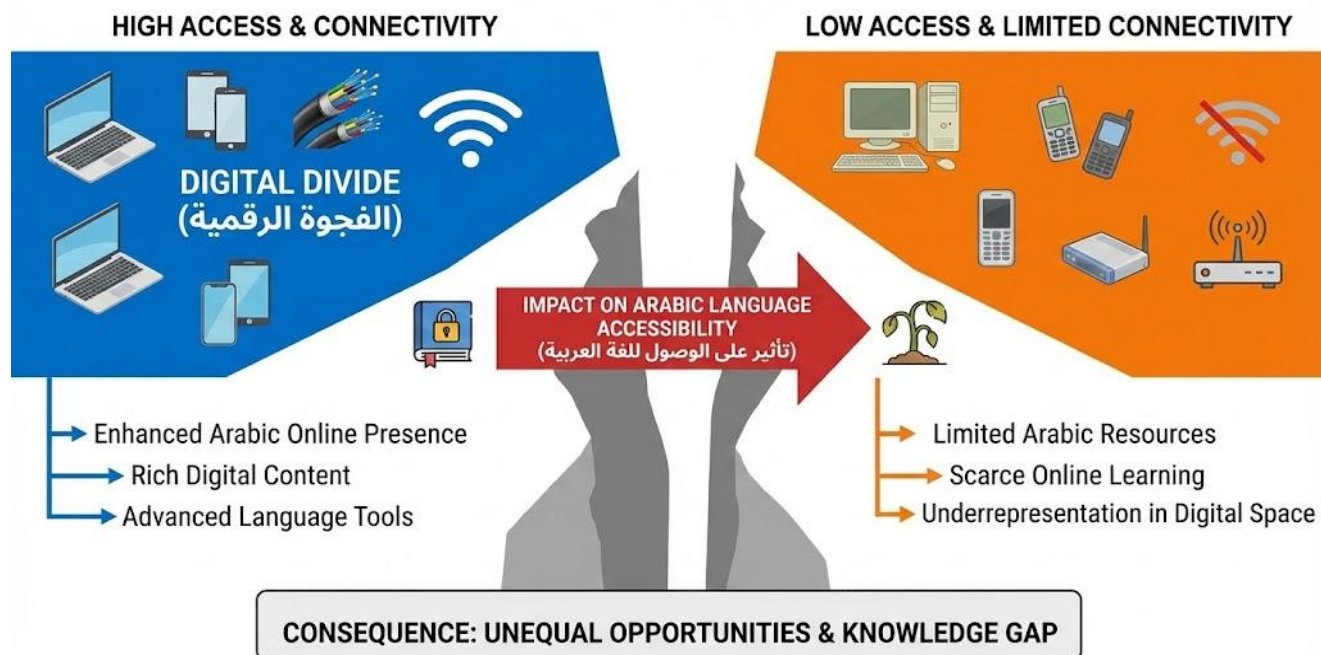


Figure 5.3 Accessibility and the digital divide in Arabic language advancement

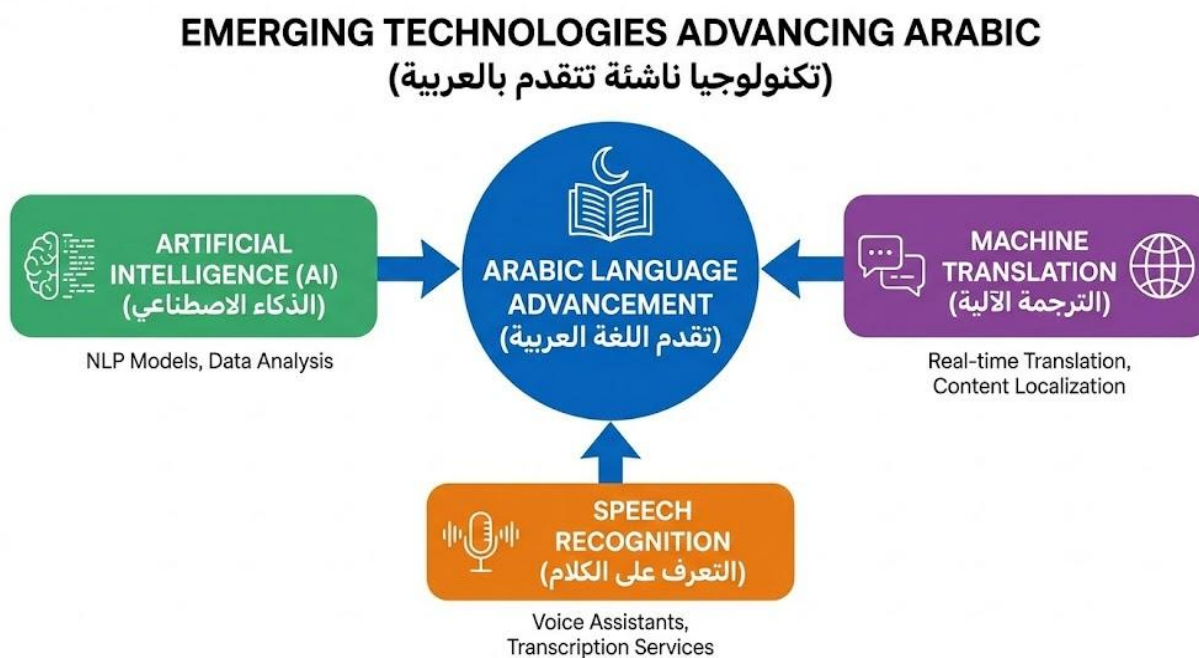


Figure 5.4 Emerging technologies supporting Arabic language advancement
